WOMANS GOLF CHAMPIONSHIP

Wilmington, Del., Oct. 13.—The eyes of all women who are interested not merely in golf but in any form of outdoor athletics for women will be turned during the present week upon the links of the Wilmington Country Club, where the completion for the woman's golf championship was opened today. Added interest is given the tournament this year by the participation of two of the most noted women golfers of Great Britain. They are Miss Muries Dodd, the present British title holder, and Miss Mabel Harrison, three times winner of the Irish championship.

The championship tournament was begun today with an 18-hole medal play, qualifying round, the best 32 becoming eligible for match play. Tomorrow the first match round will be run off with a consolation event for those who fail to reach the desired goal. Besides the second round on Wednesday, there will be an 18-hole match play handicap against bogey, while on Thursday, in addition to the third match play round, driving, approaching and putting contests will be held. Coincident with the semi-final round on Friday there will be a foursome competition on scratch basis, while mixed foursomes will be run off in conjunction with the decisive test on Saturday.

In conjunction with the meeting there is an elaborate exhibition of electric railway appliances and equipment and the latest inventions and improvements in the way of safety devices for the protection of passengers and employees.

THE SPAN OF LIFE SHOWN BY FIGURES

For Those Under Thirty the Expectation of Longevity Has Increased—Married People Fortunate

How long do you expect to live? Perhaps you have never given the matter a thought. The majority of people simply want to live as long as they can—and let it go at that. Therefore maybe it would be better to ask: How long can you expect to live?

Suppose you are between 40 and 45 years of age. If that is the case you may expect to live 23.4 years more—if you happen to live in a city. The matter of where you live changes the figure slightly but not much.

It occurred to the health department of one city to prepare a table of the expectation of life among the inhabitants of its city, in the hope that the people would help fight disease and so prolong their calculated allotted span.

The preparation of a table of this sort is a very complicated proceeding that requires an expert. But the results obtained are highly valuable. The figures are practically the same for all sections of the country. These show that there has been an increase in the expectation of life, as it is called, from the age of 1 year to the age of 30 and a decrease from 30 years on. For instance, a child 5 years old might expect to live 52 years more. That is an increase of 11 years over the expectation of life calculated a third of a century ago. An adult between 25 and 30 years of age has 32.5 years more to live, according to this table, while a person 85 years old may reasonably expect to live only 3 years and 3 months longer.

The expectation of life for men and women is different, for people in different trades it is different. These differences bring to light some curious facts. For instance comparison of the sexes instead of ages shows that women in general have about 6 years longer to live than men. The figures also show that married men live longer than single men and that married women live longer than single women. The Jew lives longer than the Gentile by a round dozen years. The negro appears to have less chance of life than the white man.

But throughout it is found that the span of life for people up to the age of 30 has increased during the last 30 years while that for people beyond the age of 30 has decreased.

ABOUT WOOD-FILLERS

The Man Who Works About the Home Needs This Information

Open-grained woods require paste filling, being "hard woods." The varieties most in use are ash, beech, butternut, baywood, black walnut, chestnut, elm, mahogany, oak and rose wood.

Close-grained woods such as bass, cedar, redwood, gum, poplar, spruce and whitewood are filled with liquid fillers, being soft woods.

There is another group of wood that occupies an intermediate place though they might properly be classed with the close-grained woods, namely birch, cherry, circassian walnut and maple. They are sometimes filled with paste filler, sometimes with liquid filler.

Chestnut and some oaks are very open-pored and not only require filling but often two fillings and a stiff paste. The purpose of the paste filler is to fill up the openings in the tissue of the wood, the liquid part of the filler saturating the tissue and so to some extent preventing the wood robbing the varnish coat and occasioning pinholing, etc. For this purpose it is best to sometimes apply a coat of liquid filler over the paste filling, and in some instances another coat of paste filler over the liquid is best. In any case the idea is to form a hard and impermeable foundation for the varnish coats that are to follow.

A filler should be colored to match the wood; but should be made a shade or so darker. The following is a very good formula for making a paste filler: Mix two parts of best coach japan and three parts of raw linseed oil, both by weight. To this liquid add enough finely pulverized silica to form a stiff paste. The mass needs to be thoroughly mixed.

A white liquid filler is sometimes desirable, and the following is a good one. In one gallon of raw linseed oil put two pounds of pale powdered resin, and place in a suitable vessel on the stove until the resin has melted stirring meanwhile. Then remove from the fire and add one pint of white japan dried and two quarts of turpentine; stir well, then set aside to cool; when cold, stir in eight ounces of corn starch. After which thin with turpentine and pass it through a strainer.

SEEDS ARE USED TO WEIGH DIAMONDS

Few People know That the Original Carat Grew on a Stately Tree

What is a carat? Everybody, at some time or another, has boasted that the ring he or she wears is 22 carats fine. Or that the diamond in the ring weighs a carat and a half and is an especially fine large, valuable stone. But what is a carat? And why was such a term selected instead of ounce or gram or carat?

It's a very curious thing that not one person in a thousand probably ten thousand—knows what a carat is. And there is probably not one person in a hundred thousand who knows that the use of the term is different in its relation to gold from its use in relation to precious stones, although in both instances the weight is referred to. The facts are these:

The original carat is the seed of an Abyssinian coral flower, or coral tree. The name was also applied by the Arabians to any pod or husk and particularly to the fruit of the locust tree. It probably was introduced into Abyssinia by the Arabs. In those days there was no system of weights or measures—or at least there was none among the nomadic Arabs and the Abyssinians. Gold was traded by its weight, and, as the seeds of the Abyssinian coral tree were uniformly the same size and weight, it gradually became the custom to weigh gold with these seeds, and gold, therefore, was said to weigh so many carats—or, in other words, so many seeds.

In modern times, with our well arranged system of weights and measures, the carat seems to have become, not a distinct term of weight when applied to gold, but a term of purity. Gold is weighed now by the troy pound or ounce. It would seem to be much easier to state that an ounce of gold is 98 per cent pure or 75 per cent pure. But the jewelers and assayers think differently. They divide gold into 24 parts, instead of 100 parts as they would do if they figured by percentage, and each of these parts is called a carat. Thus you might get a gold bracelet or necklace that weighed three or four ounces and yet would only be 14 carats fine. That would mean that your bracelet or necklace was fourteen-twenty-fourths pure gold and ten-twenty-fourths alloy. The ordinary wedding ring is 22 carats fine. It is very seldom that anything is made 24 carats fine pure gold. The metal is too soft.

With diamonds and other precious stones the carat is a term of weight—the weight of the old seeds. One carat weighs three and one-sixth troy grains in this country. But, strangely enough, it is different in other countries. For instance, in London it is 250.4 milligrams; in Paris, 205.7 milligrams; in Berlin, 205.44 milligrams; in Amsterdam, 205.75 milligrams. This system of having a different weight for the carat in different countries has caused the jewelers to start a movement for the standardization of the carat all over the world at 200 milligrams or about 3 grains in the system of weights and measures.

THE GREAT LAKES

We all know in a general way that Lake Superior is the largest and Lake Ontario the smallest of the Great Lakes, but the relative facts are scarcely known to the average person. While Lake Michigan ranks second in size, being forty-five miles shorter than Lake Superior, it is twice as deep as its greatest depth, the figures being 900 feet for Lake Superior and 1,800 feet for Lake Michigan, so that in cubical contents the latter far out-reaches Superior. Lake Huron's greatest depth also is a hundred feet more than that of Lake Superior, so that the greatest is not superior to everything after all.

Lake Erie and Lake Ontario are comparatively shallow, with maximum depth of 204 feet and 412 feet, and yet we should not like to fall overboard in either of them. In width—maximum figures—Lake Superior comes first with 160 miles, Huron second with 105, Michigan third with 84, Erie fourth with 60, and Ontario last with only 52 miles of greatest breadth.

In comparison with its area, Ontario leads with a drainage of 29,769 square miles for its area of 6,700, the others being Erie, drainage, 39,680, area, 23,000 square miles; Michigan, drainage, 70,000, area, 22,400 square miles; and Superior, drainage, 85,000, area, 32,000 square miles. Drop in elevation is very gradual, Lake Superior being 600 feet above sea-level, Michigan 578 feet, Huron 574 feet, Erie 564 feet, and then comes a big drop to 224 feet for Lake Ontario.

He can cable it necessary at a moderate expense. He sends money orders home. He receives parcels of plum-pudding at Christmas. A visit to the old land is regarded as no great undertaking.
