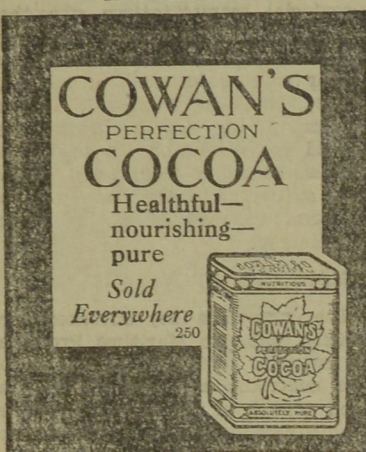

Don't expect to be able to do justice to your chicks in boxes about the kitchen stove; have plenty of brooder capacity ready, and don't be afraid of having the brooders too hot if the chicks can go in and out at will. Keep a hen and her chicks in a nice sunny place out of the wind, letting her out only on warm days; give another one liberty to go and come at will, hustling for a living on cold, wet, windy days, the chicks following after chattering and trying to be cuddled, or try two hovers or brooders furnishing somewhat similar conditions, one a great abundance and one too little heat, and compare mortality. Piling a brood of chicks in a cold box is like putting twin babies in a cold bed and saying, "Now, kiddies, get warm;" they'll do it in time, but in the meantime, what?

The following summary of yields per acre of principal grain crops in Manitoba, shows the situation in a nutshell and will convince the most skeptical that this province is one of the richest districts on the American continent.

Wheat, average for 27 years, 13.39 bushels per acre.  
Oats, average for 27 years, 35.60 bushels per acre.  
Barley, average for 27 years, 29.87 bushels per acre.  
Flax, average for 20 years, 13.16 bushels per acre.

## COLORED MAN TO HAVE SIXTH TRIAL FOR MURDER

Anniston, Ala., Oct. 28.—Preparations are rapidly being completed here for the sixth trial, on the charge of murder, of Ervin Pope, a colored man who is charged with having killed J. B. McClurkin, a prominent planter of Oxford, near Anniston, in April, 1909. Pope was tried five times and every time he was found guilty and sentenced to be hanged; yet, even the sight of the gallows erected for his execution in the rear of the county jail, could not shake the fearless confidence of the prisoner that he would not be hanged, and that his innocents would be proved in the end. From the very beginning Pope has attested his innocence and has adhered to this assertion in the face of the most incriminating circumstantial evidence. Technical flaws in the rulings of the court enabled Pope's lawyer to obtain a new trial in every case, but Pope, with the childlike simplicity of the

typical Southern negro, ascribed his success in escaping the gallows not to his lawyer's ability and to errors of the court, but to the rabbit's foot he carried in his pocket. It is the left hind foot of a rabbit "killed in a graveyard on a moonlight night," an infallible charm in the belief of thousands of his race.

The murder of McClurkin was extremely brutal. He heard a noise near his barn and when he rode toward the scene he was knocked from his horse with a heavy cudgel. His head was beaten to a pulp with a rock. Pope and another negro, John Body, were arrested soon after the murder. Pope was well-to-do, being a successful farmer. He always paid his debts and had a good reputation, but the evidence was against him, greatly strengthened by the allegations of Body, who turned witness against him.

Pope was convicted of the crime for the first time in May, 1905. Bloody shoes found in the barn in the rear of his house, overall buttons found in the ashes around a washpot, a defect in one of the hoofs of his mule and other circumstantial evidence were introduced against him but the most telling feature of the trial was the testimony of John Body, who stated that he heard the scuffle between Pope and McClurkin, who pleaded for mercy in front of his house, where the killing occurred. Body said he lighted a candle and wrote down the words of the victim and the name of Pope, so that he might not forget them. When he was released from jail he fled the country and has not been heard from since.

Bitter feeling was manifested against Pope from the first although previous to the murder he had been well liked. Special guards were kept at the jail during the hearing to protect the prisoner from mob violence. As soon as he was convicted he was hurried to Birmingham, where he was kept, except when taken to Anniston for trial. After the first trial Pope's lawyer obtained a new trial upon technical grounds. Pope was convicted again by the lower court in April, 1910, and again a new trial was ordered. Pope was tried and convicted again in the early spring of 1911, but the case was reversed and remanded on account of the admission of testimony which tended to exculpate John Body, who was believed by many to have been a party to the crime.

Pope was tried for the fourth time in February of this year and again convicted, but the Supreme Court reversed the case and the prisoner was tried for the fifth time in July and again sentenced to death, but once more Pope's lawyer was successful in obtaining a new trial upon technical grounds. The coming trial will be the sixth and its outcome is awaited with considerable interest throughout the state.

### Big Shipment of Foxes

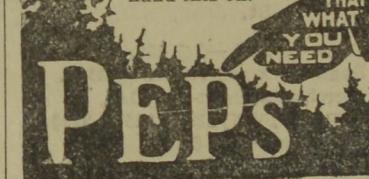

### TO HUNT FOR ANDREE

Norwegian to Probe Stories Concerning Explorer's Fate

Christian Leden, the young Swedish explorer, who brought back from Northwest Canada in 1911 Eskimo stories which apparently threw additional light on the supposed fate of Professor Andree, will spend another year and a half or two years in exploration of that far northern district. Mr. Leden said he expected to obtain further information regarding Andree, the scientist, who started in a balloon for the North Pole in 1897.

The explorer has a full description of all instruments in Andree's equipment, and will be able to identify any such articles that he may find in the Eskimos' possession. The stories previously told him related to the descent from the sky of a "large bubble" containing two people, thought by the Eskimos to be devils, one of whom was killed by arrows and the other left to his fate when the natives became frightened and fled.

### SUCCESSFUL DAIRYING

Depends to Large Extent Upon Knowing Individual Worth of Cows

There are such excellent concrete examples now and again outcropping of men who prove that it pays to take up cow testing, that their records of success make stimulating reading for dairy farmers all over the Dominion.

Here is a good example of what one man at Cedar Hall, Quebec, in the Gaspé Peninsula, accomplished by carefully watching his fairly good cows and feeding them better. The first year his eight cows gave him 33,511 pounds of milk, an average of 4,188 pounds, at a feed cost of \$32.50, netting a total profit of \$76.82, an average of \$9.60 profit per cow. Two of the best cows in the herd the first year were lost accidentally, two heifers made up the herd to eight again; a pure bred sire is kept.

The next year his eight cows gave him 41,408 pounds of milk, an average of 5,176 pounds, or 1,000 pounds of an increase per cow. The feed cost \$4.12 more per cow, but the total profit was \$177.29, or an increase of 130 per cent. in the profit. It pays to give additional feed if the cows kept are of the type to make use of it profitably.

The forcible realities are these: The gross income from milk increased by \$133.43 from the same number of cows, the profit far more than doubled, and the owner has received every encouragement to try for still better results. That is where a trial cow testing trip generally lands the herd owner.

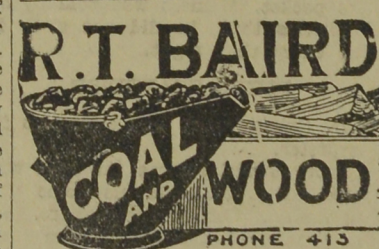
