SOME INSIDE HISTORY

"ON THE 13TH OF AUGUST, 1911, I HAD MET AT ST. HYACINTHE A NUMBER OF THE MOST IMPORTANT CONSERVATIVES AND NATIONALISTS FROM NORTHERN ONTARIO. THEY HAD COME ESPECIALLY FOR THE PURPOSE OF INVITING ME TO DELIVER TWO OR THREE SPEECHES IN THEIR DISTRICTS. IF I REMEMBER WELL, THEY HAD A LETTER FROM MR. COCHRANE, THE PRESENT MINISTER OF RAILWAYS AND CANALS. AT ANY RATE, THE INVITATION WAS CONVEYED ON HIS BEHALF. . . . MR. COCHRANE, USUALLY VERY SHY OF HIS COMPLIMENTS, HAS SINCE DONE ME THE HONOR OF TELLING ME THAT MY ARGUMENTS HAD MADE A DEEP IMPRESSION, DEEPER STILL AMONG ENGLISH-SPEAKING THAN AMONG FRENCH-SPEAKING PEOPLE.

BUSINESS IS BUSINESS

During the election campaign of 1911 the anti-reciprocity high tariff interests bombarded the English speaking people of Canada with declarations that if "the pact" were ratified and Canada should trade more freely with her neighbors the Dominion would be pried out of the empire and become a mere adjunct to the United States. After two years of the Borden government Canada imports three times as much from the States as from Great Britain and exports almost as much south of the border as to the Mother Country. It is certain that with the great reduction of the American tariff Canada's exports to the States will increase proportionately.

Where now is the "committee of eighteen," whose words and money were so much to the front in 1911? Where is "British born" Arthur Hawkes? Where do The Toronto World and News stand? The noisy Union Jack fever of two years ago has cooled. The noble eighteen are silent as long as their own high tariff protection is secure, while their selling power to the States is increased. Arthur Hawkes has become disgusted with the "empty shell" naval subterfuge of Mr. Borden. The Toronto News and World are demanding the abrogation of the Canadian duty on wheat and flour so that Canadian wheat and flour may go free to the States.

After such a somersault perhaps before long Mr. Blondin will be offering to patch up the holes in the Union Jack he used to be so eloquent about and will enlist Bourassa, Nantel, Coderre, Pelletier and the rest of the Nationalists of the Tory Alliance into support of a naval policy which will include Canadian ships, manned by Canadians and controlled by the Canadian government, as part of the imperial navy.

THEIR TUNE IS CHANGED

While leader of the opposition, Mr. Borden was wont to express great discontent that the Liberal government did not bring on all its bye-elections in bunches. It was his habit to indignantly claim that the

government was deliberately stringing out by bye-elections so as to be able to centralize all its forces on each other, and thus defeat the Conservatives piece-meal. The records show that the Liberals never deliberately delayed bye-elections and when convenient several were brought off on the same day. For instance, no less than five bye-elections were decided on December 14, 1898—and the Liberals won every one of them—while in most other instances bye-elections came in groups of two and three.

Since 1911 the contested bye-elections have been absolutely segregated by the Borden majority so as to give Hon. Mr. Rogers ample opportunity to have full swing with his election winning brigade and "Manitoba methods."

There was no reason in the world why the bye-elections in Chateauguay, East Middlesex and South Bruce could not have been held simultaneously. Had Mr. Borden any regard for his past complaints and promises the three would have been settled on the same day. Mr. Borden, however, had to subordinate party promises to partisan necessity.

It is known beyond peradventure that immense sums of money and quantities of liquor were used as Tory arguments in Chateauguay. With the same workers and same methods it is likely that the same trail of corruption will be left in East Middlesex and South Bruce.

The Closure Bill is the measure of his silence.
