DIED IN ONTARIO.

A message from Mr. George Walker of St. Stephen, formerly of this city, was received by the Misses Sweeney this morning to the effect that Austin J. Sweeney had passed away after a lengthy illness in a sanitarium in Ontario, in which he had been since spring. The deceased was well known in this city. He was about thirty years of age and was a graduate of the University of New Brunswick. A widow, formerly Miss Ethel Walker, survives and at present is in Boston. One brother, William, and two sisters Agnes and Annie of this city, and one sister, Margaret of New York, also survive. The remains will be brought here for burial.

GOVERNMENT WON
ITALIAN ELECTIONS

Rome, Oct. 26—General elections were held throughout Italy today. The disorders were not as grave as expected, although one person was killed and many wounded. Numerous arrests were made in various quarters.

The balloting was light, because on account of spring-like weather the people preferred to go on excursions rather than to the polls. Results of the elections will not be definitely known until late Monday but already the government is assured of a large majority.

Giovanni Giolitti, the premier, has been re-elected almost unanimously with the other members of the cabinet. Others elected include ex-Premiers Baron Sidney Sonnino and Luigi Luzzatti, the ex-governor of Erythraea, Ferdinando Martini, the Socialist leader; Signor Barzilai, and the former minister of public instruction; Nunzio Nasi, who served a term in prison for embezzlement, and later was elected several times to the chamber of Deputies, only to have his election annulled.

In a hundred constituencies a fierce struggle was waged, especially between the Socialists and Catholics, and in these a second ballot will be taken next Sunday.

In some constituencies, particularly in the Venetian provinces, ecclesiastics voted openly. At Cesena the bishop was the first to go to the polls. So far as returns have been received, out of 598 constituencies, 197 Liberals, or ministerials, have been elected as well as 23 Moderates, 17 Socialists, 14 Republicans and 10 Clericals.

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GENEROUS RESPONSE
TO MEET DEFICIT
ON RESTORATION

Christchurch Cathedral Congregation Has Contributed Generously Toward Wiping out Deficit of \$5,500--- Bishop of Huron to Preach

Very Rev. Dean Schofield and a number of members of the congregation of Christ Church Cathedral have been conducting a campaign among the members of the congregation with a view toward wiping out the deficit of \$5,500 on the cost of the restoration of Christchurch Cathedral have held informed the Mail today that the response to the appeal had been generous but that details would not be made public until the meeting of the Diocesan Synod next week. It is rumored that about \$4,000 has been raised toward clearing away the deficit.

Delegates to the Synod will arrive here next Monday and will be in session all week. His Lordship the Bishop of Huron will attend the Synod meeting. He will arrive here Saturday and will be the guest of His Lordship Bishop Richardson at Bishopscourt. He will preach both morning and evening at Christchurch Cathedral. The sermon in the evening will be to the students especially and those of the University of New Brunswick and the Provincial Normal School are invited.

HEAVY DOCKET
FOR OCTOBER TERM
OF DIVORCE COURT

Seven New Cases With Five From Preceding Term---Evidence Heard in Case of Stevens vs Stevens

The October term of the Divorce Court opened this morning with twelve cases on the docket. Three of these were heard at the July term of the court, standing over for argument and judgment, two were stood over on request, seven were entered for the present term as new cases.

CASES STOOD OVER.

This morning five cases in which P. A. Guthrie is counsel were stood over until Thursday, Mr. Guthrie being engaged at Gagetown in the defense of James Gibson.

The cases of Wheaton vs Wheaton and Durning vs Durning have been stood over for the present and at the request of counsel the case of Fenwick vs Fenwick has been put off for a few days.

In the case of Belyea vs Belyea, delay has been caused by inability to secure an affidavit of service from Sheriff Tompkins of Carleton County who recently was stricken with paralysis.

ARGUMENT HEARD.

In the case of Leaman vs Leaman, Dr. J. D. Phinney, K.C., argued as counsel for the plaintiff. His Honor Judge McKeown stated that as the same point was involved in the case of Hawthorne vs Hawthorne, to be heard Thursday, he would give judgment in both at the same time. The point involved is whether the confession of infidelity by husband or wife
