SUBCOMMITTEE'S REPORT
The sub-committee reported as follows:—

Hon. Dr. D. V. Landry, Chairman of Joint Committee of the Agriculture and Education departments.

SIR,—
We, the sub-committee appointed to report on the preliminary details of the proposed Rural Science School or New Brunswick, beg to make the following suggestions for your consideration.

1. A staff of six teachers to take charge of the following courses:—

(a) School Gardening and Nature Study. (Practical) instruction in methods of teaching these subjects.

(b) Plant Study, Insects and Birds with particular reference to their bearing on agricultural pursuits.

(c) Chemistry and Physics including Soil analysis, Fertilizers, Drainage etc.

(d) Rural Domestic Science, including Location of Buildings with reference to sanitary water supplies; elementary study of Bacteria, Moulds, Yeast, etc; Care and cooking of plain meats, vegetables and bread; sanitary production and care of milk.

(e) Manual Training as applied to the farm, including use of common tools in making and repairing useful implements; brief study of common woods and their values; brief discussion of the simple mechanical devices, including the lever, pulley, inclined plane etc.; care of machinery.

(f) Study of Domestic Animals—their care, productions and economic value; Farm arithmetic and book-keeping, Bee-keeping.

2.—Three courses of study only to be taken up by any student in one year. Course No. 1 to be taken by all students.

3. Two years will be required to complete the full course necessary to obtain a certificate.

4. Sessions to continue for a period of four weeks, commencing the second week in July, 1914.

5. These plans are based on an estimated attendance of not more than ninety students.

6. This plan contemplates the payment of railway fares and \$20.00 to each successful student to be paid on the completion of one term's satisfactory work in rural science and school-gardening.

tion waited upon Ald. Mitchell and notified him of the pleasure of the meeting. The alderman then went to the meeting and formally consented to be placed in nomination.

The candidature of Ald. Mitchell comes rather as a surprise to many. It is understood that a quiet canvass has been made by his friends and that he is considered a strong candidate. The nomination sought the man.

Ald. Mitchell has sat at the council board for several years. He was elected first in 1906 as a member of the City Council which installed the sewerage system. He has represented Wellington Ward several times since last spring at the civic elections, he occupied a prominent place on the ticket, which, through excellent organization, won a marked victory at the polls. He is a building contractor and has occupied a prominent place in the life of the city.

MAYOR HOOPER TO RETIRE.

His Worship Mayor Hooper has announced that he will retire from civic politics. He is now on his ninth consecutive year as a member of the civic government, seven years as alderman for Wellington Ward and two as mayor. That period of service has been seldom equalled or surpassed. No other mayoralty candidate but Ald. Mitchell has yet been announced.

ARGENTINE BEEF FOR NEW YORK

New York, Dec. 4.—The biggest shipment of Argentine beef ever brought to this country, arrived here recently from Buenos Ayres by the Lamport and Holt freighter Zinal, and was unloaded into refrigerator cars as soon as the vessel docked. The shipment consisted of 12,000 quarters 11,000 of which were chilled and 1,000 frozen.

The Zinal, which was built to carry nothing but refrigerating cargo, is a vessel of 6,000 tons and has accommodation in her compartments for 122,210 cubic feet of perishable food products.

According to a wholesale meat dealer in this city, the shipment arriving here indicated the actual beginning of a tremendous traffic in Argentine beef. The beef has been so well received in this country it is said, that the American importers have decided to order kidneys, ox-hearts, ox-tails, etc.

Before the beef quarters had been removed from the Zinal, the longshoremen took from her compartments 50 bags of ox-hearts, 50 bags of ox-tails, 22 cases of ox-kidneys, 25 cases of ox-tongues, 10 cases of ox sweet breads, 550 cases of ox trimmings, 60 cases of beef rolls, 20 packages of shank meat, 15 bags of sheep kidneys and 300 bags of boneless chuck steak.
