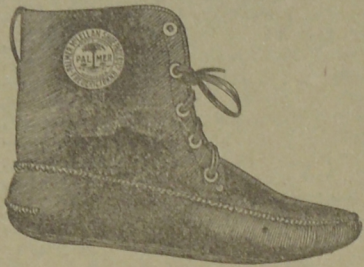
PRESENTATION AT MARYSVILLE.

WILL BRING SUIT FOR ASSAULT BY POLICEMAN

Paul Rosenorn, Resident Engineer on Fredericton-Norton Division of C. P. R. Has Begun Action--Case Will be Defended

Paul Rosenorn, resident engineer on the Fredericton-Norton Division of the C.P.R., has taken steps toward a suit as the result of an alleged assault committed upon him early Thursday morning by Police Sergt. William Duncan. P. J. Hughes of McLellan & Hughes, has been retained by Mr. Rosenorn, who left last night for Montreal on business and who will return in a few days. Mr. Hughes informed a Mail reporter this morning that he had not yet decided exactly what course would be pursued in the matter but that action of some kind would be taken. He said he already had informed the city authorities in the matter.

Mr. Rosenorn says that he was on his way to his boarding-place about two a.m. Thursday, accompanied by a member of his office-staff. He says he was behaving himself and was accosted and handled with unnecessary roughness by the police officer, being knocked down in the snow among other things.

WILL DEFEND CASE.

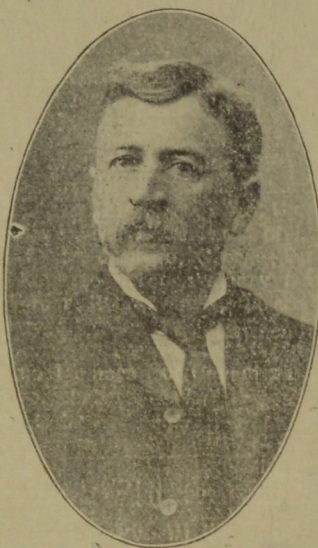

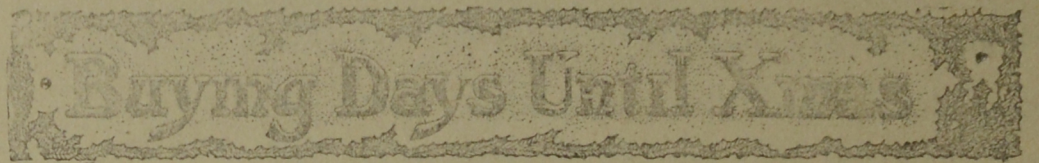
