ULSTER SYMPATHIZERS HOLD MEETING IN LONDON; CABINET ASKED TO REITERATE PLEDGE

DO NOT APPROVE NEGOTIATIONS

The Meeting Declared That Any Endeavor to Persuade Ulster to Submit to An All Ireland Parliament Would be a Gross Breach of Faith—the Government Attacked.

London, Nov. 21—A "Loyalist" meeting held in London today as a demonstration by Ulster passed a resolution calling upon the government to enter into no agreement on the Irish question until the Sinn Fein not only swore allegiance to the throne but gave effective proof of the reality of such allegiance and until the idea of a separate army for Ireland was abandoned.

The meeting placed on record its "deep sense of humiliation and regret" that negotiations were taking place between the government and persons "steeped to the lips in an expressed policy of assassination". The resolution called upon the cabinet to reiterate its pledges regarding the freedom of Ulster and gave "its emphatic opinion that any endeavor to persuade Ulster to submit to an all-Ireland parliament would be a gross breach of faith and a base betrayal of the nation's honor."

"Die Hards" Speakers.

Among the speakers were Colonel John Grotton, Henry Page Croft, Brigadier-General Decie, Lord Ampt-hill and other "die hards," who bitterly attacked the government policy in negotiating with the Sinn Fein delegates. The attendance at the meeting was not very large and the stewards who wore the insignia of the Orange lodge had an easy task.

Brigadier-General Decie, who commanded the crown forces in Limerick before the truce but who since then has resigned said the Irish had learned during the war that the British government had not the courage to deal with revolutionaries.

"The Indian revolution worked from the same room in New York as the revolution in Ireland," he declared. "Thrice we had the Irish revolutionaries by the throat and thrice we were pulled off at the moment when we were about to apply the screw tighter. The government made a truce and called a conference with men, some of whom are actually guilty of the murder of my police."

"Ulster will have to fight sooner or later, and if I were there I would fight now."

COLD SNAP IN THE WEST

Toronto and Kingston were the warmest spots at 46, ten degrees higher than in St. John.

During the recent warm wave, Boston had a temperature of 73 and New York 71. There is a heavy storm moving northward at sea from the West Indies.

HOCKEY CLUBS TO MEET THURS. IN MONCTON

N.B.H.L. Meeting at Bathurst Postponed on That Account—Two Sections Probable.

The annual meeting of the New Brunswick Hockey League has been postponed until Thursday, when it will be held in Moncton, in connection with a meeting of representatives of provincial hockey clubs called to form a New Brunswick Hockey Association as a branch of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association.

The meeting at Moncton has been called by the officers of the Eastern Amateur Hockey League of last season, and the N. B. H. L. delegates will have a caucus before going to the main meeting.

Nine clubs will be represented at Moncton, including St. John, and present plans are for the formation of one provincial association, with a schedule calling for sectional play, the champions of the divisions to meet in a play-off for the provincial championship. Inclusion of St. John makes two sections, and perhaps three possible and with inter-sectional games as well as the regular schedules there will be plenty of hockey in New Brunswick this winter.

SHERIFF OF MADAWASKA PASSES AWAY

Edmundston, Nov. 21—Joseph H. Pelletier, high sheriff of Madawaska county, died suddenly this afternoon about 2 o'clock. He had been suffering from smallpox, but was considered out of danger. Death resulted from heart failure. The news that the sheriff had passed away was received with profound regret which was greatly intensified when it became known a short time later that the sheriff's mother, Mrs. Rene S. Pelletier, eighty years of age, had died suddenly upon hearing of her son's death. The shock had been too much for her. She had been living with her son, George. The wife of the late sheriff is also very ill from the effects of vaccination.

Leaves Large Family.

Sheriff Pelletier leaves, besides his wife, who was Miss Edna Sirois seven children, the youngest of whom is only six weeks old. The funeral will take place on Tuesday afternoon, but as the house is under quarantine, friends are not permitted to go there. Deep sympathy is extended to the bereaved family.

The late Sheriff Pelletier was born in 1876 at St. Francis, N. B. He was formerly a Liberal member of the legislature, having been elected in 1912 along with L. A. Dugal, for Madawaska county. Messrs. Dugal and Pelletier defeated Charles L. Cyr and Max D. Cormier by a large majority.

(Sheriff Pelletier represented Madawaska in the Legislature from 1912 to 1917 and with Hon. L. A. Dugal constituted the opposition which exposed the crookedness of the Fleming regime. In the election of February, 1917 he did not seek re-election but soon after the change of government was appointed sheriff of Madawaska.)

Bureau Of Public Health.

THE BRITISH ATTITUDE ON QUESTION OF ANGLO-JAPANESE ALLIANCE

Will Stand by Japan But This Does Not Mean That the Treaty Will be Continued Against the Interests of the United States or Any Other Country—Good Work Being Accomplished by the Conference.

Washington, Nov. 21—The present British attitude on the question of the Anglo-Japanese Alliance, British spokesmen declared today, is not different from that recently expressed by Lloyd George who said it would not be proper to say to Japan "you stood by us during the war, but we don't need you now, so good-bye."

The British emphasized in this connection, however, that the prime minister also declared this did not mean Great Britain would continue the treaty against the interests of any nation and certainly not against the United States as there was no other country with which Great Britain so strongly desired to act.

BRIAND STIRS DELEGATES

In an emotional plea for national security pronounced by Aristide Briand, her premier, France informed the arms conference, that however deeply she might be moved by the call to lighten the burdens of armaments she dared not destroy the effectiveness of her army so long as the situation in Europe remains what it is.

Summoning to the effort all the dynamic force of his eloquence the "strong man of France" had the rapt attention of the conference for an hour as he recounted one by one the perils that beset his people. Briefly he declared the old imperialistic party of Germany still was covertly teaching the religion of war and hoping to turn to its advantage at the very door of France 7,000,000 of men trained in the use of arms, while beyond lay Bolshevik Russia with her millions stirring in unrest whose final course no one could predict.

MR. BALFOUR'S VIEWS

When the French Premier has concluded, Arthur J. Balfour responded for Great Britain with a virtual pledge of British support, should the civilization of Europe be again threatened as it was in 1914.

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NOMINATION PROCEEDINGS THIS AFTERNOON WERE MERELY FORMAL IN CHARACTER

Col. W. J. Osborne Placed in Nomination by J. J. F. Winslow and J. B. McNair—R. B. Hanson, K. C., nominated by C. D. Richards—Some of Those Names on Col. Osborne's Papers—Fredericton Declared by Judge Slipp to Have 5,754 Voters.

Nomination proceedings in York-Sunbury which were held here between noon and two o'clock, were entirely formal in character. Sheriff J. B. Hawthorne, returning officer for the constituency with H. G. Fenety as clerk held court with no person in attendance but the representatives of the candidates. The papers of Col. W. J. Osborne, Liberal candidate, were filed by J. J. F. Winslow and J. B. McNair Those of R. B. Hanson, K. C., Conservative candidate were filed by C. D. Richards. Both sets of papers were largely signed.

Voters in Fredericton.

Judge Slipp concluded his labors as revisor this morning Monday being the final day for addition of names to the electoral lists. This afternoon the lists were placed in the printer's hands. Judge Slipp announces a total of 5,754 names including 179 added by the revisor, for the City of Fredericton. There is comment upon the fact that the number is altogether too great for a population of 8,080 which is given Fredericton by the census returns. Either too many names are on the electoral lists or the census returns greatly understate Fredericton's population.

There is to be a rousing meeting at McAdam tonight. The chair will be taken by W. C. Whipple a returned soldier. The speakers will be Col. Osborne, Hon. W. E. Foster premier of the Province and W. P. Jones of Woodstock.

MEIGHENTITES ARE SURE TO BE SNOWED UNDER

Ottawa, Nov. 22—Reports from different provinces indicate that the Meighen Government will be overwhelmingly defeated at the polls on December 6th. The best advices from the Maritime Provinces state that the Liberals are practically sure of at least twenty five of the thirty seats. While it is next to impossible for the party to make any substantial gains in Quebec it will do at least as well as in 1917. In many of the Constituencies of Quebec the government is represented by straw candidates who have no hope of saving their deposits. At least four of the Quebec ministers are certain to go down to defeat.

In Ontario Hon. R. B. Bennett predicts that the government will carry 50 seats but this is an extravagant estimate. It is doubtful if the total number will exceed forty. The western provinces, with the single exception of British Columbia hold out little hope for the Meighen Government. It is generally conceded here by men of all parties the Meighen Government group will be the smallest in the next Parliament.

Cadet Organization.

Lt. Col. A. B. Snow, reports very satisfactory progress by the cadet corps in the northern part of the province. In Edmundson, Major Rideout has taken over the organization of a corps. The Grand Falls corps, which has been without an instructor for more than a year, will be taken over by Mr. Bell, of that town. This corps won the Macdonall Cup for leadership of the province the year before last and still holds it. The Plaster Rock corps under the leadership of Mr. Nicholson has showed very satisfactory progress and it is said to be one of the most energetic in the province. In Woodstock, Captain Hoyt and Captain Manzer have taken over the command in place of Major MacLaughlin.

SPEAKER AT NEW YORK BANQUET

Ernestly Hopes for the Success of the Disarmament Conference at Washington—The Carrying Out of the Hughes Plan Would be a Great Boon to Mankind.

New York, Nov. 22—The spectacle was presented at the Commodore last night of the men who are supposed to profit greatly by war wildly cheering an idea and a pledge whose consummation would take away those particular profits.

These men were the members of the American Iron and Steel Institute at dinner in the grand ballroom of the hotel, with Marshal Foch as guest of honor. They make armament, guns, all sorts of martial tools. The utterances they applauded so fervently was that of Charles M. Schwab, head of the largest war materials works in the world, largest American builder of warships.

"But I say to you from the bottom of my heart," Mr. Schwab said while the listeners thrilled to every word "that if the statesmen now assembled in Washington under the far sighted leadership of our President and Secretary Hughes should find it possible to bring about disarmament and permanent peace gladly would I see the war making machinery of the Bethlehem Steel Corporation sunk to the bottom of the ocean."

A Boon to Mankind

It was obvious he told the diners that the carrying out of the plan laid down by Hughes "may involve great monetary loss in some quarters."

"But", he added "such a thing as financial loss can be of no consideration when compared to the inestimable boon to mankind which would be involved in the realization of that magnificent plan. What red blooded American would not, indeed, make any sacrifice if the burden of armament could be lifted from the shoulder of humanity. May God speed the day when this noble conception can be realized."

"And so let us say to the men gathered in Washington, let it go out from this gathering of men of the steel and iron industry, that we are solidly behind every effort that can make which will hasten the coming of the time when war shall be no more."

CANDIDATES LINED UP TODAY

St. John's Nov. 22—Nomination for the federal elections are taking place today throughout the province. The lineup shows the Liberals have candidates in every constituency except where T. W. Caldwell is running as a Progressive. In Kent there is no straight conservative candidate but the support of that party will go to Mr. Doucett who is running as a Progressive. It is generally conceded that the Liberals will make a sweep of the North Shore Counties and have an equal chance with their opponents in the remaining constituencies. Word from Carleton-Victoria indicates the return of the Progressive candidate.
