plementary things he said of Premier Fleming reached the ears of the latter, and the upshot was that Col. McLeod was told in plain language that he must quit the local government and he could suit himself about running for Ottawa. When the full meaning of this edict was digested by the colonel, he descended from his perch and decided that a seat in the federal parliament was not such a bad thing after all. And now we have the announcement that he is going to quit the local cabinet and enter dominion politics.

Mr. J. K. Pinder, M.P.P., has been boomed by the large section of the party as the next federal nominee, but the boom has never been encouraged by Hon. Mr. Hazen. He had promised Premier Fleming to support Col. McLeod and therefore he could do nothing for Mr. Pinder. The King of the Nackawick, upon learning just how matters stood, he came to the conclusion that he was too old to enter federal politics. He has been promised something good, but just what it is time alone will determine.

As matters stand now the Supreme Court Act will be proclaimed at once and Mr. Crockett will go to the bench. A bye-election for York will be called on early in January, with Col. McLeod as the Tory candidate, backed by a "harmonious" and united party.

Rumors of a re-construction of the local cabinet are rife today. One report has it that Premier Fleming may resume his old portfolio of provincial secretary and that Mr. Pinder will become surveyor general. Mr. Fleming has been doing the work of both departments for a year and would no doubt like to be relieved of one of them. Mr. Pinder would, of course, prefer the public works portfolio but there does not seem to be much prospect of getting it at present. It is said that the cabinet changes will be announced in the very near future.

LYCEUM COURSE—GREAT ENTERTAINMENT COMING

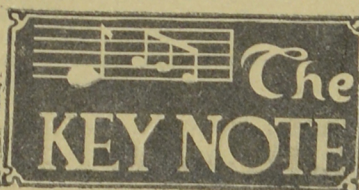
