

THE ELECTRIC GENERATOR The Dynamo Was Discovered Through

a Boy's Experiment

. L. .

The fact is not generally known that the electric generator or dynamo was actually due to an experiment by a 16-year-old boy, the son of Profes-sor Henry, a scientist of fame in the first half of the last century.

Professor Henry had experimented exhaustively in electricity, endeavor-ing to get from chemical batteries a current that could be commercially He discarded a group of re used. volving magnets as useless, giving it to his son as a plaything. After the boy had amused himself with twirling it and adjusting it in accordance with his own ideas, he secured one of the little testing instruments—a galvanometer—used by the professor or detecting the electric current, and, hooking on the wires in the way he had seen his father attach them, he continued twirling the magnets. While he was doing this, the pro-

fessor entered the room, and was astonished to see the needle of the galvanometer drawn to one side, showing the existence of an electric current. This had never before been produced by such magnets without the use of a chemica' battery. Within two hours, Professor Henry had attached the discarded magnets to a lathe, and by quick, steady revolutions, produred current and an amazing spark. The true dynamic electric generator had
