THE ELECTRIC GENERATOR

The Dynamo Was Discovered Through a Boy's Experiment

The fact is not generally known that the electric generator or dynamo was actually due to an experiment by a 16-year-old boy, the son of Professor Henry, a scientist of fame in the first half of the last century.

Professor Henry had experimented exhaustively in electricity, endeavoring to get from chemical batteries a current that could be commercially used. He discarded a group of revolving magnets as useless, giving it to his son as a plaything. After the boy had amused himself with twirling it and adjusting it in accordance with his own ideas, he secured one of the little testing instruments—a galvanometer—used by the professor for detecting the electric current, and, hooking on the wires in the way he had seen his father attach them, he continued twirling the magnets.

While he was doing this, the professor entered the room, and was astonished to see the needle of the galvanometer drawn to one side, showing the existence of an electric current. This had never before been produced by such magnets without the use of a chemical battery. Within two hours, Professor Henry had attached the discarded magnets to a lathe, and by quick, steady revolutions, produced a current and an amazing spark. The true dynamic electric generator had been discovered.

When it is considered that every electric power plant, every electric lighting plant and every electric railway in the world are based upon that boy's play-hour revelation of the possibility of making an electric current without the use of chemicals, this little known instance of what boys have done for the world is entitled to a very high place.

CORPORAL PUNISHMENT

Teacher Must be a Psychologist to Know When to Apply it

Corporal punishment in schools is a subject which is brought into the public eye every so often. It is a topic with painful memories for most people and one which is heatedly discussed among the parents of school children, but the average grown-up still believes that corporal punishment is a good thing. Discretion should be used in the application of the rod, however, and it is in the lack of discretion among some school teachers where the system of corporal punishment is weak. There are children who can understand nothing quite so well as a "licking," but there are also children to whom a blow is a serious nervous shock. It is more or less a matter of temperament, which, despite the protests of the press agent, is not the exclusive possession of theatrical stars. The best school teacher must be more or less of a student of psychology and must be able to distinguish between "bad boys" and thoughtless ones.

It must be admitted that there are "bad boys." True, they generally turn out to be the best of men, but they are boys who need an occasional and sometimes frequent applications of the cane or strap, whichever happens to be the favorite weapon of the teacher. To them it is an honor to be "licked," and they display their bruised hands with considerable pride. But to the nervous, sensitive child corporal punishment does more harm than either the teacher or parent may imagine. It bruises the spirit more severely than the flesh. Such a child grows up timid and fearful, shrinking from expected blows before they are threatened.

It is rather a pity that school teachers are not better paid. If they are worth anything at all, they are worth at least double what they receive at the present time. They hold almost supreme power over the children in their classes; it is to them that the rising generation looks for guidance and knowledge, yet they receive what is hardly better than a pittance.—Vancouver Sunset.

OPTICAL TELEGRAPH

This Serves as a Telephone For Deaf People

An optical telegraph intended to fill the place of the telephone for talking with a deaf person has been invented by a deaf and dumb married couple. It consists essentially of a keyboard, as in a typewriter, through whose keys single electric currents pass. In each circuit is included an incandescent lamp with a flat surface, bearing a letter of the alphabet or a Roman numeral. Pressing any key causes the corresponding lamp to glow. Thus words and sentences are spelled out and numbers are formed.

The keyboard can be operated as fast as that of an ordinary typewriter, so that with practice communication becomes very smooth and rapid. Each station, of course, must contain both a sender and a receiver, and these may be in different rooms or in houses a long distance apart.

The instrument can be conveniently used for conversation between a deaf person and a normal person who is ignorant of the deaf language. The silence with which the device is operated is a very important point in its favor. This feature might make it especially useful where quiet or secrecy in transmitting information is desirable, as in sending war news or secret instructions in business houses.—"Literary Digest."
