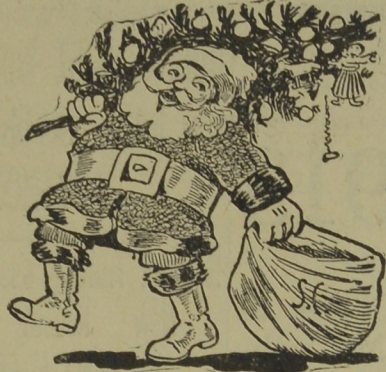

MONUMENTS FOR LIARS

The Sea Dyaks Are a Very Truthful and Honest Race

So truthful are the members of the race known as the Sea Dyaks of Borneo that when a really good lie is told to them they build a monument to keep green the memory of the perpetrator.

This is only one curious piece of information among many supplied in an article in the "Mission Field." These people, it is stated, are as honest as they are truthful.

So disgraceful do they consider the deceiving of others by an untruth that such conduct is handed down to posterity by a curious custom. They heap up a pile of branches of trees in memory of the man who has uttered a great lie, so that future generations may know of his wickedness and take warning from it.

The persons deceived start the tugong bula—"the liar's mound"—by heaping up a large number of branches in some conspicuous spot by the side of the path leading from one village to another. Every passer-by contributes to it, and at the same time curses the man in memory of whom it is. The Dyaks consider the adding to any tugong bula they may pass a sacred duty, the omission of which will meet with supernatural punishment, and so, however pressed for time a Dyak may be, he stops to throw on the pile some branch or twig.

In his jungle home the Dyak is remarkably honest. Families are often away from their homes for weeks at a time, living in little huts on their farms, and, though no one is left in charge of their rooms in the lone village house, things are seldom lost.

The writer states that with an experience of nearly twenty years in Borneo he knew of only two instances of theft. One was the theft of rice. The woman who lost the rice most solemnly and publicly cursed the thief, whoever it might be. The next night the rice was left at her door.

HEART SURGERY

Remarkable Operations Are Performed on This Vital Organ

Probably the most daring chapter in modern surgery is that which treats of operations on the heart. "The road to the heart is only two or three inches long, but it has taken surgery nearly 2,600 years to traverse it," was one writer's striking remark. Many shrewd observers in the course of the ages had noted that all heart wounds did not result in instantaneous death. But it was not until 10 or 15 years ago that surgeons began to act upon this knowledge. In exceptional cases death did not result immediately from a heart wound; there were intervals of a few minutes, a few days, or a few weeks. Why not utilize this interval in an attempt to sew up the wound? Medical history of late years reports many successful operations of this kind.

An especially noteworthy one, performed upon an Alabama negro boy in 1902, illustrates the resources of modern heart surgery. This boy had been the victim of an especially nasty stab wound. The knife had penetrated the apex of the heart and passed into the left ventricle, making a wound nearly half an inch long. When the boy was placed on the operating table in a little negro cabin the signs of death had already appeared. His feet were cold, and his face showed signs of the utmost distress.

The surgeons made a little window-like opening just above the heart. Through this they could readily see the injured organ, the blood spurting from the wound at each pulsation. One surgeon put in his hand, pulled the heart upward and held it while another sewed the wound with a catgut. The operation—performed without an anesthetic—lasted 55 minutes; on the sixteenth day the boy was sitting up; in a short time his heart was as good as new.
