MANUFACTURERS' PARTY WILL VISIT THE EXHIBITION

Expected to Arrive by Steamer Victoria at 6.30 p. m.--Two Hundred Persons in Party--St. John Delegation

About two hundred persons, members of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, their wives and children will arrive at about 6.30 this evening by the steamer Victoria from St. John, that steamer leaving St. John at noon. On their arrival here the party will be received by Mayor Hooper, President J. T. Jennings of the Board of Trade and Publicity Commissioner McDade. The visitors will then be taken to the Fredericton exhibition where they will inspect the exhibits, attractions, etc. A special train will take the party back to St. John, leaving at 10.15 tonight.

SOUVENIR TICKETS.

Mr. C. Fred Chestnut, who is in charge of the arrangements for the entertainment of the visitors at the fair, is having special souvenir tickets prepared for them. As no exhibits are to be allowed to leave the grounds until the band plays "God Save the King" at 10.30, the Canadian Manufacturers Party will have a good opportunity of seeing what Fredericton can produce in the way of an exhibition.

NEW DIVISION OF C. P. R., NORTON TO FREDERICTON

Through Train Each Way Daily, Also Mixed Train, Chipman to Fredericton Each Way Daily--To Operate From This City

A definite announcement concerning the train service to be given by the C.P.R. from Norton to Fredericton via the New Brunswick Central and the Fredericton & Grand Lake Railways is expected to be made shortly. It is known now, however, what is the general purpose of the C.P.R. in this connection. The timetable will not be known for some time.

The two railways, the Central of New Brunswick and the Fredericton and Grand Lake will continue to be known by those names and will be run as separate lines, although together forming a division of the C.P.R. The lines between Norton and this city will form a new division of the C.P.R., which will be operated from Fredericton. Divisional Manager Sherwood, who has been in charge of the Central Railway, will reside here already having taken up his residence.

It is contemplated to have a train leave Norton on the arrival of C.P.R. train from Halifax, about 5 p.m., and arrive here about 8 p.m. Another train is to leave Fredericton about noon, after the arrival of the train from the West, arriving at Norton about 3 p.m.

In addition to these through trains a mixed train is to leave Chipman each morning at 7.30 or 8 o'clock, arriving at Fredericton about ten

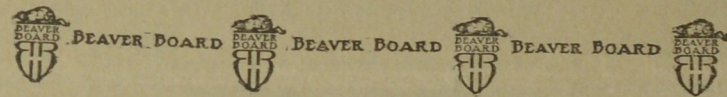
