Much Money Spent in Draining Lake in South America

For hundreds of years the belief has prevailed that gold dust and gems to the value of \$5,600,000,000 lie buried through the ages that it was the bury-ing-place of fabulous wealth.



The Spaniards were just on the point of succeeding in the task of draining the lake after years of hard work spent upon it; but when they were half-way through, the sides fell in and years of work were wasted. In 1900 an English company undertook In 1900 an English company undertook the work. They proceeded to drain it by digging a tunnel through the adjacent mountains, bringing it be-low the level of the surface of the water.

water. The lake was not emptied until 1963, but it kept refilling on account of the heavy rains and the presence of springs. A number of jewels and ornaments found in the mud of the lake bed seemed to indicate that the search for hidden treasure was to prove successful. 
