

HENRY CLAY BARNABEE

70 YEARS OLD

Boston, Mass., Nov. 14—At his cheerful and pleasant suburban home near Boston, Henry Clay Barnabee, the veteran singer and comedian who for nearly a quarter of a century has been the idol of countless theatre patrons throughout the country, celebrated the seventieth anniversary of his birth today, surrounded by his numerous friends in and around Boston and overwhelmed with messages of congratulation from all parts of the country. Mr. Barnabee, who retired from stage life years ago, is still enjoying good health and his years rest lightly upon him.

Mr. Barnabee was born in Portsmouth, N.H., Nov. 14, 1833, and after having received a public school education came to Boston where he obtained a position as a clerk in a dry goods house. He joined the Mercantile Library Association and fre-

quently took part in the entertainments given by the association. It was thus that he made his debut, by reciting serious poetry at entertainments. Accidentally he discovered that he had talent as a humorist and a beautiful voice. He developed both gifts and became one of the most noted church singers in and around

Boston. He made his debut as a professional singer in 1865 and after a number of years at Lyceum Work, became one of the founders of the Boston Ideal Opera Company in 1879. In 1887, with Tom Karl and W. H. Macdonald, he organized the Bostonians, with which company he remained until he retired.

THE MONTREAL MARKET REPORTS

Montreal, Nov. 13—The thinning out of the supplies of good cattle in the country caused an easier feeling in the local live stock market this morning for all the lower grades of butcher cattle and prices showed a decline of 25 cents per cwt.

The demand from American buyers for stockers, feeders and canners has fallen off considerably, owing to the fact that the cattle offered for these purposes are too poor for the American trade.

The better grades are still holding firm.

The stories from Ottawa that the prices of beef have been raised whether the demand warranted it or not has not met with instant local favor among the cattle trade and although they admit that there has been a good rise since the tariff was removed, they say this has been absolutely necessary owing to the sharp competition in the country with American buyers.

There is a strong undertone to the market for lambs owing to the continued scarcity and the buying up of supplies in the country by American buyers, especially in the Province of Quebec.

A stronger feeling has developed in the market for hogs and prices are 25 cents cwt. higher today.

Receipts today at the East End (Canadian Pacific) Stock Yards, were 2,500 cattle, 800 sheep and lambs, 1,500 hogs and 500 calves. The United States shipments this week have been 29 cars.

Receipts at the West End (Grand Trunk) Stock Yards, were 1,000 cattle, 900 sheep and lambs, 900 hogs and 200 calves. Shipments to the United States this week have been 60 cars.

Hogs, select, \$10; sows, \$8; s'ags, \$5 to \$5.50 cwt., all weighed off cars. Grass calves 4 to 4½ cents per lb.

"MAN A QUADRUPED"
