Canadian naval affairs progressed and in 1911 tenders for the construction in Canada of the nucleus of a fleet unit were invited, involving an expenditure of upwards of \$11,000,000. But immediately after that the imperial conference was on at London, and was followed by the election, forced by the decision of Sir Wilfrid Laurier to accept the Tory challenge and appeal to the people on the reciprocity question.
