EXONERATES JESS
WILLARD OF BLAME

Says Killing of "Bull" Young Was Unintentional--Prosecution Will be Continued, However

Los Angeles, Calif., Aug. 26--The death of John ("Bull") Young was "unintentional by Jess Willard," according to the verdict of a coroner's jury today. The death was caused, the verdict said, by "contusion of the brain, due to a blow on the chin delivered by Jess Willard."

The prosecution announced that the coroner's verdict would not alter the manslaughter charges against Willard and eleven others as a result of the fatal boxing contest last week at the Vernon Arena. It was announced tonight that there would be no other bouts at the Vernon Arena until the last of September at the earliest.

DOG CHEWED UP

SOUTHERN LEAGUE PENNANT

Little Rock, Ark., Aug. 26--All because of a dog, it is probable that no pennant will be awarded the winner in the Southern League this year. The dog entered the headquarters where the pennant was kept, tore it to shreds and devoured it. The pennant is paid for by annual assessment on all the clubs.

Flynn put Langford to the mat in the opening round with a hard right smash to the jaw. Sam was up in a few seconds but somewhat dazed. He backed into a corner and, with a smile on his face, stalled Flynn off from following up the good advantage.

Instead of getting more confident Flynn lost all he had after he delivered that blow. Langford worked cleverly for the remainder of the round and was nearly over the effects of the punch when he went to his corner.

Langford kept forcing Flynn for the rest of the bout but Flynn covered so well that often Langford had to pull punches to avoid hurting his hands by hitting Flynn on the elbows. On that account some of the fans thought Langford was not trying, but he was working hard all the time to bring the bout to an end.

Flynn looked in pretty fair shape, but Langford appeared fat and bigger than he was when he showed here before.

In every round Flynn landed left hooks and jabs to Langford's face but there was no great amount of force behind the punches. He acted as if afraid. His blows did not bother Sam to any extent.

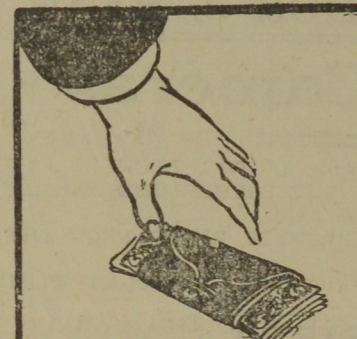
JACK JOHNSON TO BE MADE FRENCH CITIZEN

DRIVER GREELY, EIGHTY ONE YEARS OLD, AT BANGOR

Drove in Tuesday's Opening Events--Purse Divided in 2.15 Mixed Class ---Maude Nelson Won 2.20

Bangor, Me., Aug. 26--The races at the Eastern Maine Fair opened today. The track was in good condition until the later part of the afternoon when a drizzling rain made it soft and slippery and slowed down the time.

The three-minute trot proved an easy win for the Bangor horse, Young Constantine.

Everard H. Greeley of Ellsworth, eighty-one years old, said to be the oldest driver on the American turf, handled a Todd colt of his own breeding and training in this race.

In the 2:20 class for trotters and pacers, when a field of eight starters, Maud Nelson, entered and driven by C. A. Swazey of Springvale, won. The mare was beaten in the second heat by the Lewiston stallion, Baron Sidnut, who was forced to make a new mark of 2:16½.

The 2:15 trot and pace was the hardest fought race of the day. After the Bangor stallion Prince Aldeen handled by Charles A. Jackson, the one-armed trainer, had taken the first heat, Duck Lawrence drove May Day to victory. May Day is the entry of H. W. Watson of Haverhill, Mass.

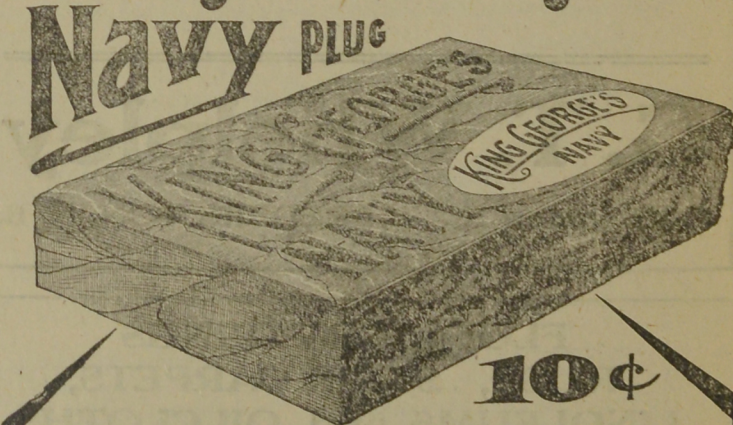
