## CANADIAN EXPORTS

Goods From Canada Are Sold In South America

Chile imports a considerable quantity of farm implements from Canada. Canadian windmills, one or two industrial machines, a few tools, are also found there, and an occasional shipment of lumber and paper is also imported. To Bolivia, nothing beyond some chairs, brooms and wooden goods seem to be exported.

Peru takes an occasional shipment of lumber. In Ecuador, Canadian flour is finding a market, and bids fair to rival the United States product, if indeed it does not eventually drive it out, or at least form that portion of the trade which buys quality and not the cheap low-grade article which is obtained in California and the Pacific coast of the United States. In Guayaquil, some Canadian tools are also seen. Panama is now purchasing Canadian flour, and also small quantities of silver-plated ware and a patent automobile tire cement.

## FADS AND FASHIONS

New York, Nov. 29.—The new “line” or silhouette is still in the making and heaven only knows what it is going to be. Judging from some of the extreme “advance models” displayed by noted fashion designers in Paris and elsewhere the coming style promises to be a sort of cross between Oriental trousers and a ballet skirt. However, a great many things may happen before the new style crystallizes into definite form. Some of the best Parisian dressmakers are introducing a curious combination of panniers and tunics, the panniers being rather flat and the tunics distinctly Persian in outline.

This style was exploited with considerable success in a dinner gown of orange colored charmeuse which was shown by one of the exclusive designers recently. On the draped fronts of this skirt there were some fine Japanese embroideries and the short, rather flat, panniers were carried out in dull blue chiffon of the exact shade of the most prominent designs on the skirt. Then there was a Persian tunic of diamante tulle, fringed with crystal and a folded corsage of oyster white tulle, mounted over flesh pink chiffon. These were diamond shoulder straps and a broad sash of black crepe de chene embroidered in cut jet and finished off with jet fringes. At the waist, directly in front, there was one of the new conventional flowers which are made of velvet or plush. The flower was in velvet of the deepest shade of blue, and for a heart it had a huge diamond button.

chiffon. This stuff is heavier than mousseline de velours and very much more durable. It is being made in all the rich shades of claret and red, which are now so fashionable, and in the purple known as “violet de Monseigneur” it is of rare beauty.

Taffeta combined with velvet is a well liked combination for bridge gowns. The taffeta usually appears in the flounces or tunic of the skirt, and again as collar and trimming on the bodice. Premet, one of the noted Paris designers, delights in black taffeta for the bustle-like wrap-on his velvet costumes but if the gown is to be worn for bridge, where the wearer must necessarily be seated for some time, these elaborate back drapings are not practical.

Second in demand to velvet at the present time is duvetyn, the all-silk fabric which has proved more popular and wearable than the silk and wool combinations. By way of variety, two new duvetyns have been introduced by the creator of the original fabric, a striped effect resembling corduroy and a brocade design. The plain duvetyn combined with either of these makes an interesting gown. Though there is sufficient body in the all-silk duvetyn to make it an ideal material for the three-piece street costume, yet it is not too warm for an interior frock, especially when it is combined with chiffon or some other thin material.

### History of False Teeth

Until little more than a century ago humanity had to rub along without false teeth, of which nowadays one firm alone claims to sell more than 12,000,000 a year. The first successful maker was Glussepangelo Fonzi, an Italian dentist, who started practice in Paris in 1798, and, thanks to his skillful treatment of Lucien Bonaparte, soon made his way. After years of experiment he discovered the substance from which artificial teeth are made, and received the gold medal of the French Academy of Science. One of the earliest persons fitted with false teeth was the Empress of Russia. After Waterloo Fonzi migrated to London, and then to Madrid, where Ferdinand VII. rewarded him with a yearly pension of a thousand ducats for a set of false teeth.

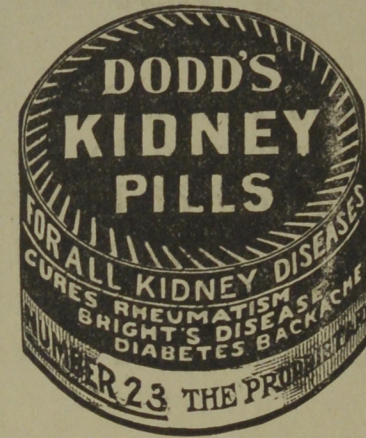
The International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers has voted to establish a home for sick, incapacitated and aged members.

## CONSERVATIVE WON ONTARIO BY-ELECTION

London, Ont., Nov. 27.—John McFarlan, of Nisour, today defeated John W. Laidlaw, East Middlesex Alliance—Liberal candidate for the legislature, by a majority of 293. The vote was a large one, totalling 4,237, of which Mr. McFarlan received 2,265 and Mr. Laidlaw, 1,972.

The fight was a warm one, Mr. Howell, the Liberal leader, appearing several times in the riding.

The temperance issue, while it played a large part in the fight, did not altogether account for the result. Mr. McFarlan's own township, Nisour, gave a majority against him of 120.

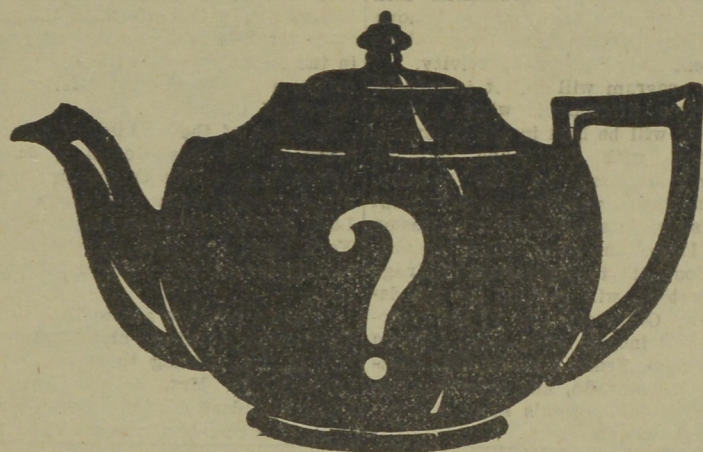
