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MR. BORDEN'S OPPORTUNITY

It will be interesting to watch the efforts of the Tories to prevent hearing of the Chateaugay election trial. By invoking every possible legal hindrance to the courts of justice they delayed the Macdonald protest from November 18th, 1912 until November 11th, 1913, with the result that for a year the riding was misrepresented, with a man sent to Parliament by such notoriously corrupt methods that even Hon. Mr. Rogers did not dare defend them in court. The same "Minister of Bay-Elections had charge of Chateaugay. Similar methods were practised by the same men who had worked in Macdonald. Will Hon. Mr. Rogers have the cynical audacity throughout?

It may be possibly by a system of to follow the Macdonald precedent filing objections and appealing technical decisions from court to court to delay the Chateaugay protest until a general election is in sight. Premier Borden dare again to flout public opinion in this way after his pre-election promises.

Mr. Borden at Halifax on August 20, 1907, when he announced his Halifax platform and swore allegiance to the principles therein contained, he enunciated in the first plank of his platform that "UNTAINTED ELECTIONS WERE ESSENTIAL TO THE SUCCESS OF DEMOCRACY," and he sounded the call to all true Canadians to "FIGHT THE BALLOT THIEF AND THE BRIBER." Let us quote from his speech on that occasion:

"Strike not only at them, but expose and send to the penitentiary, if possible, the respectable gentlemen who supply the funds and superintend the work from a safe distance. Fight also any influences within your own party which favor corrupt methods. Let there be no party fund, the details of which may not be known and the expenditure of which cannot be made public. Let your elections be conducted according to honorable, decent and clean methods. A campaign to this end should be begun and persisted in. But, above all, there should be an unflinching determination to pursue by every punishment known to the law the respectable conspirators and not along their infamous instruments employed and paid to subvert the will of the people by bribery, ballot-switching and every other fraudulent and corrupt practice."

Later on in the same speech, Mr. Borden named as the first plank of his platform:

"More effective provision to punish bribery and fraud at elections, to ensure thorough publicity as to expenditures by political organizations, to prohibit contributions thereto by corporations, contractors and promoters, to expedite the hearing of election petitions and to prevent collusive arrangements for the withdrawal or compromise thereof, to PROVIDE FOR A THOROUGH INVESTIGATION OF CORRUPT PRACTICES, AND, IF NECESSARY, TO APPOINT AN INDEPENDENT PROSECUTING OFFICER CHARGED WITH THE DUTY, to simplify the procedure therefore, and to enforce the law SO AMENDED."

Again, when accepting the Conservative nomination in Halifax on September 14, 1908, Mr. Borden spoke in this way:

"One condition I make imperative in my acceptance. The campaign must be a clean one. No corrupt practices must be employed in our behalf. I do not fear defeat in a clean fight. BUT I PREFER OVERWHELMING DEFEAT TO VICTORY WON BY IMPROPER MEANS. I STAND UPON MY PLATFORM OF A YEAR AGO. FIGHT THE BALLOT THIEF AND THE BRIBER. FIGHT ALSO, ANY INFLUENCES WITHIN OUR OWN PARTY WHICH FAVOR CORRUPT METHODS."

Will Mr. Borden have the courage to stand up for his professed convictions? Will he be a man of his word and order now a full investigation of the Chateaugay election? Will he see to it that the "respectable conspirators," some of whom sit at his council board, are "pursued by every punishment known to the law?" This is the testing time for Mr. Borden. If he refuses to take action his hypocrisy and humbug will be forever exposed.

Keep your ideal before you like the cloud by day and the pillar of fire by night which guided the people of God from the tribulations of bondage to the promised land."

"Let my last word be this: Let us all together, old and young, join hands, gird our loins, buckle on our armor, unfurl our standard, and go forward together in service, in earnest, whole-hearted, unselfish service for Canada first, Canada last, and Canada forever."

STOCK MARKET

New York, Nov. 29—Money rates, indicating a tightness, at least temporary, are influencing stock prices now more than anything else. Adverse factors have been sufficient for some time to create a downward tendency but the money rates have taken hold more effectively than anything else.

The outcome of the session yesterday demonstrates this very plainly, as declines are noted in a great many stocks. Undoubtedly some liquidation has been going on and adjustment of accounts over the period of high money rates are to be expected. It would not be surprising if the loss of cash will be very large. Principal stocks like Union Pacific, United States Steel, Canadian Pacific and Southern Pacific are to sell ex-dividend in a few days and probably efforts will be made to have these stocks recover their dividends and shorts may cover up for the time being.

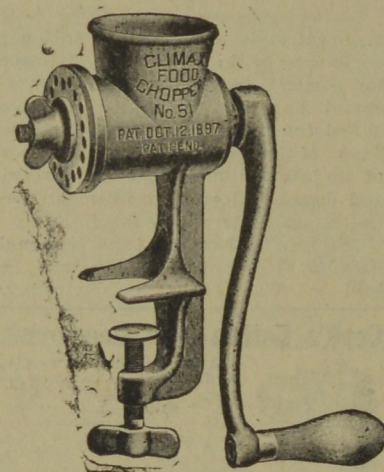

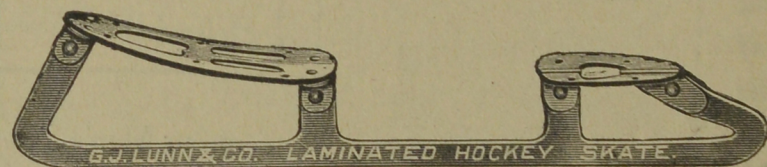
