Gives Her Impressions of the Visit in an Interesting Letter to a Friend Here--Says the Earl Owns a Magnificent Estate

A Fredericton lady now touring the Old Country, was recently entertained by Lord and Lady Ashburnham at Ashburnham Place. In a letter to a friend here she gives her impressions of the visit as follows: "Well, here we are at Lord and Lady Ashburnham's and I really cannot start to describe this wonderful place. I will have to save all up and tell you about everything when I return. We arrived here this morning and go back late tonight. Lord and Lady Ashburnham have been very kind to us. They showed us all over the house and I never saw so many beautiful things before in my life. The room I occupied is really wonderful—all upholstered in sax blue brocade satin, furnished in mahogany all draped with brocade satin. The curtains and carpets were most elaborate, over ninety years old but looked as if they were only bought yesterday. The room was decorated with huge bowls of roses and orchids. Never saw anything like them. I intended going back to London tonight but Lord and Lady Ashburnham would not allow me to go. They are having the large dining-room decorated for dinner tonight and insisted on our staying. "I had a walk around the garden, and oh, what lovely walks they are. MEXICAN TROUBLE

Victor Hatheway Midshipman on Cruiser Berwick of British West Indian Squadron Now in Mexican Waters

Relatives in this city have received word from Midshipman Victor Hatheway that he is at the scene of trouble in Mexico. Mr. Hatheway is on the Cruiser Berwick of the British West Indian Squadron which is based on Bermuda and which recently was ordered to Mexican waters to protect the interests of British subjects, which are threatened by the revolution in Mexico.

The letter written by Mr. Hatheway said that the officers and crews of the British warships were hoping that they would be sent ashore in case of trouble in Mexico becoming serious.

Midshipman Hatheway is a son of Mr. F. W. Hatheway of this city and was one of the students first entered at the Royal Naval College of Canada, Halifax. In February he went to England the Canadian cruisers being laid up by the present Dominion Government and was allotted to the Berwick as a Midship in the Imperial Navy.

FINISHED SAWING.

Elwood Burt's mill at Burt's Corner, stopped sawing on Tuesday last after two years' operation. It will commence sawing again in January. Mr. Burt expects to have 5,000,000 feet to saw next year. Of that amount 2,000,000 will be hauled to the mill and 1,500,000 is lumber which was hung up last year.
