DIRECTUM I MADE NEW WORLD'S PACING RECORD

Goshen, N. Y., August 21.—By pacing a mile in 2.02½ in the final heat of the 2.09 pace here, yesterday, Directum I, the sensational pacer owned by James Butler, of New York, established a new world's record, reducing the mark set by himself at Monroe last week, by one and a half seconds. This new mark equals the time made by Uhlan, the champion trotter, two years ago.

Slack Work by Fredericton Team—Good Luck Made 9 to 5 Victory—Horrible Exhibition at St. John—Marathons Beat St. Croix 18 to 0—Fredericton at Bangor Today

Fredericton captured another game from Bangor yesterday and today and tomorrow will play in Bangor. The Pets pulled off some pretty punk baseball yesterday and scarcely deserved to win. Bangor was crippled in the outfield, Reed hardly being able to walk. Heavy batting was the feature of the game. Fredericton had two home runs—both in Reed's section of the outfield and Bangor had one due to a bound of a ball which appeared to be going straight at Bob Ganley. Three two-baggers and a brace of three-baggers also were made. The Pets at times played like a bunch of old women, including conversation and all together it was not a satisfactory game and did not please the crowd. The team can put up some gilt-edged play and that knowledge was what kept the fans from getting too sore.

MOREY HIT HARD.

Dave Morey was banged around in fierce fashion by the Maine team. He appeared to have nothing and was taken out at the end of the sixth. Danny Donovan, he of the smile, went in and finished well. Danny is a corner. It was one of Morey's off days and he should have been taken out earlier. Hart pitched for Bangor and was batted heavily.

In the field Bangor had quite a few errors but Fredericton's punk work was of the kind that does not show in a box score.

In the third Bangor made one run. Wakefield hit a low one to centre-field. Ganley got ready to play it when the ball suddenly bounded to his left and what should have been a single was a home-run. In the fourth Boardman hit safely. Cooney followed suit. Reed sacrificed, and Boardman scored on Dutton's sacrifice fly. Wakefield fanned and the side was retired, Cooney not getting beyond third. In the fifth two more came in on three singles and a two-bagger. There was another in the sixth on a couple of singles.

The Pets did not get going till the fourth. In the first Pat Duggan had a nice three-bagger but was caught at the plate trying to score on it. In the fourth Bob Conley drove out a three-base hit and scored on Bert White's hit. In the sixth Fredericton tied the score, making four runs on two bases on balls, batter hit by pitcher and single and a two-base hit. In the seventh they won the game. Keaney drove one to deep left for three bases at least had Wallace not reached up and the ball not stuck to his glove. Ganley followed with a single. Duggan then neatly placed the ball over Reed's head. It was good in any game for four bases and with Dutton forced to chase it, was a home-run sure. Stone duplicated the feat immediately afterward. That netted four runs. White made a three-bagger and scored when Tewhey threw wild. That finished the scoring.

"GRANITE STATE" WON BY WALTER COX AT ROCKINGHAM

Drove Great Race With Lady Grattan
---Tommy Horn Took First Heat in Great Race

Salem, N.H., Aug. 21.—Walter Cox, before a crowd of sixty thousand persons, made one of the best drives of the year at Rockingham Park today, winning the "Granite State," valued at \$5,000, with Lady Grattan. Lou McDonald out-stepped the field in the opening heat with Tommy Horn, though Cox brought Lady Grattan up to a close finish, the first three horses being lapped at the wire. Tommy Horn led the second heat till right to the wire when Cox nipped him with Lady Grattan. Geers was a length back with Reusens. Lady Grattan led all the way in the third heat. Reusens was breaking and running the last twenty yards but the judges placed him second. In the final heat, Lady Grattan broke soon after the word, Reusens taking the lead in the back stretch. In the last furlong Cox challenged Geers and fairly outraced him.

Tommy Murphy of New York, never won a cheaper race than the pacing division of the American Horse Breeders' Futurity with Tilly Tipton. Of the \$3,000 the winner got \$2,100, while Homer Baughman and Ella R. K took \$387.04 each.

Bill A was the pick of the talent for the 2:20 trot but Allie Merrifield of Baltimore, had no trouble in annexing first money, with Bon Ton. Cochato Maid, Baron Sidnut and Lady Watts took turns in finishing in second place.

Earl Jr, the Canadian pacer, that has been winning free-for-alls this season over the half-mile tracks, finished a neat trick by taking the last pace here in Grand Circuit company. Braden Direct had the call with the followers of the "Big Line" but he was unable even to carry a brush with the winner in home stretch drives, breaking in each heat.
