

LOUISIANA CONSERVING HER OYSTERS

New Orleans, La., Sept. 11.—In order to enforce the conservation of the Louisiana oyster beds a new ruling was put into effect today which provides that any boat fishing for oysters must be registered in the State. In this way the owners can be held responsible. All catches must be landed on Louisiana soil and if shipped from the port of entry must be marked "Louisiana Product." If shipped outside the State a privilege tax of three per cent will be assessed.
