### - RULES FOR A DUNLAP PONY COMMERCIAL CONTEST -

RULE 1.—Any child not over sixteen years of age who is not a child of any employee connected with Business House mentioned in Folders or grandchild or niece or nephew of any of the participating merchants, may become a Contestant in the DUNLAP PONY COMMERCIAL CONTEST by enrolling his or her name at the places of business of all of the merchants who are joint participants in this Contest.

RULE 2.—For all money paid to any of the participating merchants during the progress of this Contest, either on old accounts or on cash business, 25 votes shall be given for each 25 cents so paid; 10 vote coupons and 5 vote coupons may be used at the discretion of the merchant.

RULE 3.—Under no consideration shall the schedule mentioned above be changed nor shall any additional votes be awarded by any merchant at any time during the progress of the Contest. No coupons except those printed by THE DUNLAP PONY COMPANY shall be considered valid coupons.

RULE 4.—A sealed ballot box shall be placed in the store or office of each participating merchant for the reception of said votes. Said box shall be opened by said merchant in exactly two weeks from the date on which this Contest starts. The votes contained in said box shall be counted by him or by parties selected by him and the result of said counting shall be kept a secret.

RULE 5.—Said ballot box shall be opened every two weeks thereafter during the progress of the Contest; the ballots counted in like manner and the result thereof kept a secret.

RULE 6.—As an incentive to the early casting of votes and to facilitate the counting thereof, the following bonuses shall be given. The votes cast for each Contestant during the first period shall be increased 50 per cent. In other words, if Contestant A has 100,000 votes and Contestant B 90,000 votes, 50 per cent. shall be added to the vote of each so that A will be credited with 150,000 and B with 135,000 votes.

RULE 7.—The votes cast for each Contestant during the second period shall be increased 40 per cent.; the votes cast for each Contestant during the third period shall be increased 30 per cent.; the votes cast for each Contestant during the fourth period shall be increased 20 per cent.; the votes cast for each Contestant during the fifth period shall be increased 10 per cent.; the votes cast for each Contestant during the last period shall not be increased at all.

RULE 8.—At the conclusion of the Contest three disinterested judges shall be selected by said merchants who shall tabulate the results certified to them by each participating merchant and shall award the Grand Prize of the Shetland Pony, Carriage or Sleigh and Harness to the child who has received the greatest number of votes.

RULE 9.—Each merchant agrees to carefully keep his records and not to divulge the contents thereof to any Contestant, to any of their friends or to any other participating merchant. By so doing no one will know who is in the lead at any stage of the Contest.

## Dimple K. Broke Track Record at St. Stephen

### SIX EVENTS ON GRAND CIRCUIT AT SYRACUSE

Anvil Beat Dudie Archdale in Two  
Heats of Exhibition Mile—Earl  
Jr. Won

Syracuse, N. Y., Sept. 11.—Six events made up the card for get-away day for the Grand Circuit meeting at the New York State Fair here today. The feature event, an exhibition race between Dudie Archdale and Anvil, two trotters, owned by Frank G. Jones of Memphis, Tenn., was won by Anvil in two heats. An effort was made to break the record of 2:01 held by The Harvester. The best time was 2:04½, which equals the mark held by each horse.

The Earl Jr. won the free-for-all pace in which four horses started. In the second heat the winner equalled the mark for the fastest heat of the year, on the Grand Circuit. The time was 2:02½. Robert Milroy won the Chamber of Commerce stake of \$2,000 for 2:08 pacers in straight heats.

Nata Prime carried off the honors in the 2:12 trot after four heats. She won the last three heats easily, the time in each being 2:10½. The 2:07 pace went to Margo Hal, driven by McDonald after Russell won the first heat with Hal McKinney.

There were five horses entered in this race, which was also won in straight heats by Thomas S, owned by P. H. Reed of Fort Fairfield, Me.

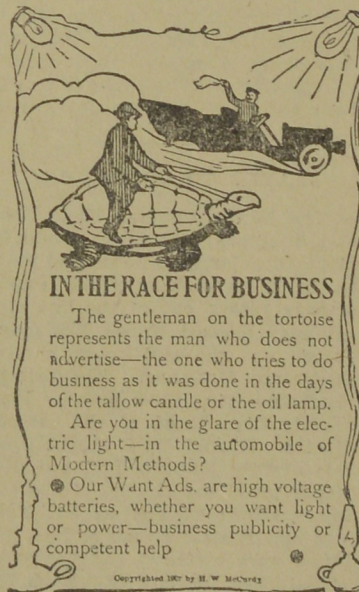
### SPORTS OF ALL KINDS

## LIPTON RECEIVED RACE CONDITIONS YESTERDAY

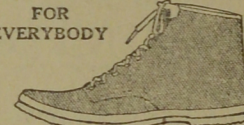

## PELKEY DENIES CHARGES OF MAKING FRAME UP

Calgary, Sept. 11.—Tommy Burns is today exhibiting a telegram from Arthur Pelkey in which the latter denies ever having issued any of the statements credited to him by the coast sporting writers in which he is alleged to have charged Burns with having forced him to agree to a fixed fight with Burns in Calgary and also with having extracted an unfair contract from Pelkey while the latter was under the charge of manslaughter here in July. Pelkey has also wired the Calgary Herald denying he has broken with Burns. In view of Pelkey's interview at Victoria yesterday in which he corroborated a Portland despatch telling of his break with the ex-champion the situation is perplexing and the idea is general here that an effort is being made to smooth things over.
