HUNTSMEN EN
ROUTE TO THE
MIRAMICHI WOODS

Big Game Season Opens on Monday—
Many American Sportsmen Have
Already Arrived—Earl of King-
ston Due Here Tomorrow

The big game season opens on Monday next and the indications are that so far as the number of visiting sportsmen is concerned it will be quite up to the average. Already a number have gone to the Tot/Aque woods and several parties have arrived here en route to the Miramichi.

Heretofore non-resident sportsmen going into the woods were allowed to deposit the price of a license with game wardens and have it forwarded to them as soon as the season is opened. This year, according to the reports of guides, Premier Flemming has instructed wardens to take no money for licenses prior to opening of the season. This, however, has not prevented many sportsmen from coming ahead of time and going into the woods. Non-resident sportsmen as a rule, observe the law pretty well and even if they had licenses they are not likely to do much shooting before the season opens.

The license-fee for non-resident sportsmen remains at \$50 but residents this year must pay \$2 instead of \$3.

ACTION LIKELY
TO RESULT FROM
BRIDGE ACCIDENT

Negligence Alleged and James H. Moore Who Had Arm Broken Wants Damages—Other Employees May Do Likewise

The accident at the Fredericton—St Mary's highway bridge Wednesday morning, which resulted in James H. Boone having his right arm broken and being severely hurt otherwise, probably will result in legal action being taken to recover damages. The ground for action will be negligence on the part of the employees of the Foundation Company, which is superintending the work of erecting a new draw-span and receiving a percentage of the total cost for so doing. It is alleged that the hard-pine sheathing which was being used in the construction of the coffer-dam was not properly braced and on that account fell. Several employees who were working at the bridge were compelled to jump into the water when the sheathing fell and to swim ashore. It is understood that they will claim damages also on account of the effect of exposure and chill.

Mr. Boone probably will be represented by the legal firm of McLellan & Hughes.

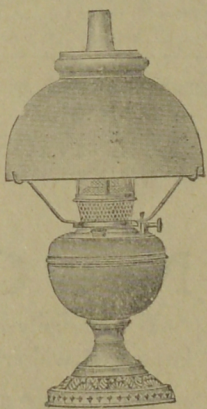

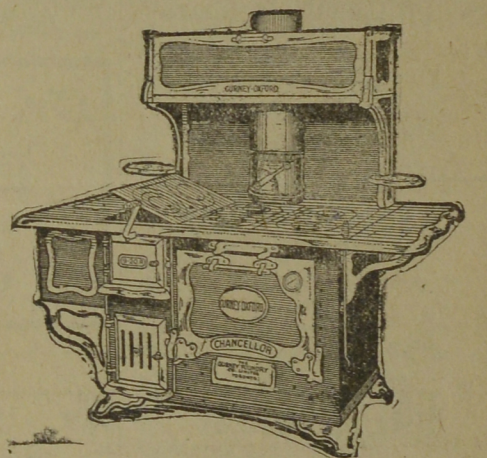
