## BANK OF N. S. OFFICIAL CONFESSES TO THEFT

Toronto, Oct. 24—William Macintyre, formerly accountant of the St. John branch of the Bank of Nova Scotia, was arrested here tonight charged with the theft of \$10,000 from the bank at St. John, a few weeks ago. Nearly all the money was found on him, it is said.

Toronto, Oct. 24—Charged with the theft of \$10,000 from the Bank of Nova Scotia at St. John, N.B., William Macintyre was arrested here tonight.

Macintyre had been a clerk in the bank in St. John and was transferred to Chicago. It was while he was in Chicago that the large shortage was discovered in the eastern branch and the Chicago police were wired, but Macintyre had disappeared. Pinkerton men traced him across the border into Toronto, finally locating him at the King Edward Hotel here.

Concerning the Macintyre case, The Telegraph says:

William Macintyre, formerly of the old Bank of New Brunswick staff and lately accountant of the Bank of Nova Scotia, Chicago, made a confession yesterday in Toronto to the theft of \$10,000 from the Bank of Nova Scotia, St. John, early in September last, on the eve of his departure for Chicago.

A warrant has been issued for his arrest and he will be brought back to St. John for commitment.

The case has been in the hands of Stanley Bate of the Pinkerton Detective Agency, Montreal, for some weeks, and a chain of evidence, culminating in his confession, was obtained in St. John.

Mr. Macintyre held the position of accountant in the head office of the Bank of New Brunswick here previous to the amalgamation with the Bank of Nova Scotia, and continued in that office, jointly with the ac-

countant of the St. John branch of the Bank of Nova Scotia, until the time of his departure to take a similar position with the Chicago branch of the bank. He is a young man for the responsible position and had made his way rapidly in the service of the bank.

The announcement of the facts of the case will put an end to various street rumors that will clear all other members of the bank staff of the suspicion under which they have felt that they were laboring, of course unjustly.

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## NEWS FORECAST FOR THE COMING WEEK

Washington, D.C., Oct. 25—From Philadelphia, where he is to attend the Congress Hall dedication today, President Wilson will proceed direct to Mobile, Ala., where he will arrive Monday morning. The President will spend the day in Mobile, delivering an address on rural credits before the Southern Commercial Congress, and leave that evening for Washington, arriving Wednesday.

The Southern Commercial Congress which will hold forth in Mobile during the first half of the week, promises to be a most notable gathering. The convention theme will be "The Relation of the United States to the Panama Canal, to Latin America and to World Commerce."

According to the latest advices from Europe, the marriage of Miss Nancy Leishman, daughter of the former American ambassador to Berlin, to the Duke of Croÿ, is to be performed Tuesday in the cathedral in Geneva, Switzerland. The engagement of Miss Leishman and the Duke of Croÿ has attracted much attention because of the "dynastic" objections of the Duke's German relatives. It has been said that the members of the Duke's family may contest the validity of his marriage to an American girl, who can never, in Germany, at any rate, legally call herself Duchess of Croÿ or enjoy any rights at a German Court.

A notable conference of the premiers of the Canadian provinces, similar to the conference held two years ago, has been called to assemble in Ottawa Monday. The conference will again take up the matter of the objection of the Maritime Provinces to having their representation in the Dominion parliament cut down. Other subjects to receive attention will be the adjustment of provincial subsidies and reform in the judicature act calculated to produce uniformity.

The National Convention of Methodist Men, which is to begin its sessions in Indianapolis Tuesday, will be the first great gathering of its kind in Methodism. Three thousand lay and clerical delegates from every section of the country will meet to discuss the united missionary work of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

The second annual convention of the Investment Bankers' Association of America will meet in Chicago on Tuesday for a three days' session. This is expected to be the largest convention of investment bankers ever held and representatives from about five hundred of the leading investment banking houses in the United States and Canada will attend.

Hearings of arguments on the appeal of the officers and members of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Iron Workers, who were convicted and sentenced to Leavenworth prison in the dynamite cases, are scheduled to begin Wednesday in the Federal Court at Chicago.

Following a spirited campaign a general election will be held in Newfoundland on Thursday. The rival parties are headed by the present premier, Sir Edward Morris, and the ex-premier, Sir Robert Bond.

Among the notable gatherings of the week will be the convention of the National W.C.T.U., in Ashbury Park, N.J., and the annual meeting of the National Association of Railway Commissioners, in Washington, D.C.

## HON. S. H. BLAKE ON THE CHURCH SERVICES

That the churches are not ready for union, that they must first get rid of a chilling worldliness, a tendency to form worship and mechanical services, is the opinion of Hon. S. H. Blake of Toronto, voiced in an open letter from his pen.

"If a union be attempted," he says, "without casting out the world from the members who are to compose it, this will breed decay and a process of disintegration will set in as such ineffectual union is inaugurated. If you desire a mechanical union of churches in order to save money in the work which they are attempting to carry on, this should not be difficult to accomplish. It must be clearly understood that this is not the union for which our Lord prayed. Such a union is pleasing to the mere man whether inside or outside the church; it does not disturb him and is now much in the air."

Mr. Blake finds in the intoning of prayers one of the sources of weakness. He says: "To what may the cold, prayerless, self-sufficient ungodly state of the church be traced? Must not the virtual abandonment of prayer be placed first? The people on it an

Q were and are being taught to abandon it and are abandoning it in our churches. Most naturally it follows that it is not found in the homes. This portion of the service is taken possession of by the choir and ceases to be prayer. The tone and spirit of prayer is cast out. The inspiration from on high is looked for in vain. The holy, grave and reverent manner of the early days is replaced by a cast-iron, unnatural utterance on one note which the choir seeks to catch from the minister, who seeks in turn to pick it up again from the choir. The process of educating the people away from prayer to a monotonous sing-song game between the minister and the choir has been fatal to the act and spirit of prayer.
