## TWO FACED CAMPAIGN

The Conservative campaign sheet in Chateauguay proceeds under a big heading "THE BLOOD TRIBUTE," to quote extracts from Sir Wilfrid Laurier's speech on the naval resolution in parliament on December 12, 1912, in which he said that unless he mistook the spirit of the Canadian people they did not want they hybrid contribution policy "but they will insist that Canada's contribution to Great Britain should be of men as well as money." The latter emphasized with italics.

It again quotes Sir Wilfrid Laurier in the same speech, pointing out that Great Britain was never so wealthy as today and that "What she needs today then is the heart, the energy and the muscles of her subjects throughout the entire world." This again emphasized with italics.

The article again quotes Sir Wilfrid as saying:

"If there were an emergency, if England were in danger—no, I will not use that expression; but if England were on trial with one or two or more of the great European powers, my Right Honorable friend (Mr. Borden) might come and ask not \$35,000,000 but two, three or four times this amount. We would put at the disposal of England all the resources of Canada, and there would not be a single dissident vote."

Next this Tory campaign sheet quotes Hon. G. P. Graham as saying in the same debate, "What do these French-Canadians think of a government which wishes to give to the empire aid in money, and WHICH, REFUSES . . . OUR LIVES FOR ITS DEFENCE," and, "announcing that they have money to lend but that their ancient fighting spirit is gone and that they WILL NOT FURNISH A SINGLE MAN . . . Let us give to the empire that of which she has much greater need than money, that is the shedding of our blood if it is necessary."

Then Dr. Michael Clark is quoted, in italics, as saying:

"If the storm of which Mr. Borden spoke were to break upon the empire not a drop of Canadian blood would be spilt or offered."

In the same vein the Tory sheet quotes Messrs. Guthrie and Bolvin, embellishing with capitals and italics any reference to blood or fighting by "Canadians."

It winds up by quoting Hon. Dr. Pugsley as saying:

"You are willing to furnish the ships, but you have not sufficient patriotism or courage to equip them with Canadian sailors, (and in italics) TO PLACE OUR YOUNG MEN BEHIND THE GUNS AND SEND THEM TO FIGHT FOR CANADA AND THE EMPIRE."

This is the kind of stuff used by the Jingo-Tories behind Mr. Borden when they come to the Province of Quebec. The unholy alliance with the Nationalists is as strong as ever. The Tories who delight Ontario with their shouts of patriotism do not hesitate to quote and distort every loyal and imperial utterance of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his followers in order to foster opposition to them in the Province of Quebec.

How will this style of double dealing suit the electors of English-speaking constituencies? They must agree with Sir Wilfrid Laurier when he said that he would rather be defeated and in opposition than elected and in power by the means which Mr. Borden had adopted. Hon. Sydney Fisher, defeated in Chateauguay, retained his personal and political honor—the day won was for the Tories, and they sacrificed both.

The International Railway, which was constructed when the old government was in power, is to be taken over by the Federal government in the course of a few weeks and made part of the I. C. R. The bonds of this road were guaranteed by the province and when the transfer is made the liability of the province will be wiped out. The Hazen-Fleming brigade put up a vigorous kick against government assistance to the International Railway but after coming into power they readily consented to a bond

guarantee for the Pinder spur line in the Parish of Southampton. We have not yet learned of any negotiations for the transfer of this latter road to the Federal government. The C. P. R. is going to lease and operate it—we are told.

Hon. H. F. McLeod has been proclaimed Chieftain of the Tory party in York and it was Ex-Ald. Guthrie and a few other Tory office holders who did the proclaiming. This is a little rough in Mr. O. S. Crockett M. P. who had a seat in parliament four years before Col. McLeod was able to win the confidence of the people. Mr. Crockett has never been defeated while Col. McLeod on his first appeal to the people was walloped to the tune of 1000 majority. Then when it comes down to achievements The Mail while it has no particular love for Mr. Crockett, believes that he has accomplished more for the County of York in two years than Col. McLeod has been able to do in six.

American concerns have representatives in Carleton county buying up large quantities of hay and potatoes. This goes to show that when Mr. F. B. Carvell, M.P., advocated larger markets for the farmers he was working in the interests of the fine county of Carleton, which he represents. It also goes to show that the balance Tories who went about the county declaring that the United States was an exporting nation and did not need our produce were either humbugging the people or did not know what they were talking about.

Liberal victories in the Municipal elections throughout the province indicate that the influence of the Flemming government is on the wane. The new highway act, which is nothing more than a bad copy of the old act which the people condemned in 1908, and the act of last session which imposes an extra tax for the support of the provincial hospital, are doing splendid work for the Liberals.

The Flemming government with its record of broken promises, extravagant expenditure and increased taxation is rapidly losing ground in York County. The results of the Municipal elections indicate that it is making no friends in other counties of the province. The people appear to be getting wise to the curves of the Sanctimonious Premier Flemming.

One hundred carloads of potatoes or five train loads have been shipped out of Fredericton this month to the United States. Hurrah for the larger market.

**NEW MOVE FOR THAW'S RETURN**

Albany, N. Y., Oct. 24—William Travers Jerome and Deputy Attorney-General Franklin Kennedy left today for Concord, (N. H.), armed with newspapers requesting the return of Harry K. Thaw of this state. Governor Glynn signed the new requisition for extradition late today after a conference with Jerome Kennedy and Attorney-General Carmody.

While it was agreed that new papers were not absolutely necessary, it was decided that they be issued in order that there might be no question raised as to the validity of the requisition formerly made on the New Hampshire authorities. The original requisition was based on his indictment yesterday in New York for alleged conspiracy.

## TO TRY VON KLEIN AGAIN

Portland, Ore., Oct. 25—The 'case of E. E. C. Von Klein, which attracted much attention at the time of his arrest in Chicago last winter, is on the calendar of Judge Morrow's court here for trial next Monday. Von Klein is to be tried for the theft of \$3500 worth of diamonds from Ethel Newcombe of Portland, who was responsible for his arrest. A previous trial on the same charge resulted in a disagreement of the jury. Von Klein is also under an indictment for alleged bigamy. He is said to be the son of a well known professor at Evanston, I. I. Prior to his present trouble he was engaged in the jewelry business in Minneapolis. It is reported that one of the women who was a principal witness for the prosecution at the first trial will not be on hand to testify against Von Klein at the approaching trial.
