The last match before Thursday's Intercollegiate League fixture with Mt. Allison saw the U.N.B. team in fine trim and working smoothly. Unfortunately the team opposing the Red and Black was so weak that the game played Saturday with the St. John Athletic Club was uninteresting and the college team did not have to play hard to win. The score was 27 to 0. Nine tries were made by the college team, all but one of which being made by the backs. Six were made in the first half and three in the second.

ST. JOHN WEAK.

The St. John A. C. team was weak much weaker than was expected. Drummond, captain of the Provincial Normal School team, was pressed into service and played a good game at quarter. The St. John men said that arrangements had been made to play here on Saturday, the 18th and for that reason several of their players could not get away last Saturday. The forwards were outplayed in the scrum and only at rare intervals did they open the game up and dribble. At this sort of play they made some ground but lost it again to the superior team work of the Red and Black. The two forwards were the most prominent of the half-backs.

U.N.B. WORKED WELL.

The whole U.N.B. team worked well and Coach Campbell says the form shown was satisfactory. The match was played in rain on a muddy field, the weather so far this season being as unfavorable as last autumn, when almost all matches were played in rain. The ball was hard to handle and its condition probably also had something to do with the inability of U.N.B. to convert any goals. Maimann and McGibbon made the attempts. McGibbon almost put the ball over on an easy kick but it struck a goal-post and rebounded. As a matter of fact, U.N.B. has shown little ability to convert tries in any match this year. The scrum had a new personnel, Griffiths and McLeod being in the front with "Lassie" Brewer at "lock." The combination worked well, the heeling being the fastest and cleanest of the season. The quarters and halves worked hard and were very effective.

SEVERAL ACCIDENTS.

Several accidents occurred during the game, two or three of either team being hurt. Hazen Howard of St. John, had his mouth and tongue badly cut making a tackle. Of the U.N.B. team Otty, Bender, Murphy and Dougherty all retired more or less seriously hurt. They were replaced respectively by VanWart, Edgecombe, Burden and Jago.

THE SCORING.

U.N.B. started the scoring early. Balkam getting over after a few minutes of play on some good work by the halves. The second try was scored by Murphy around the ocher end. Melrose got away from a scrum near St. John's goal-line for the third try. Bender scored the next after some loose play by St. John, which let him get the ball close to the line. 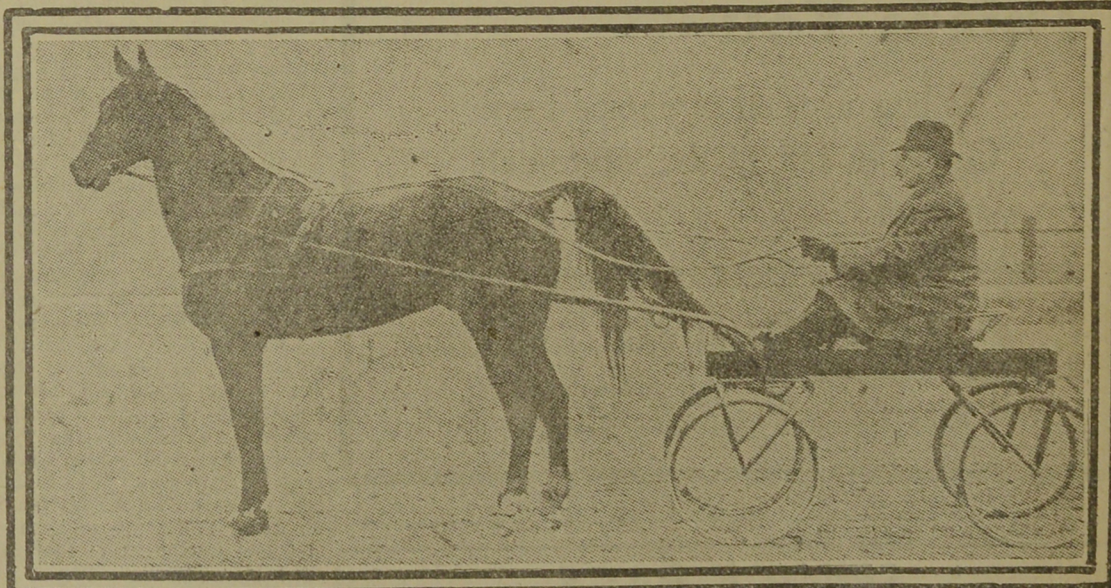
