WATER RISING.

The river has risen two feet since Friday and probably will overflow the low-water wharf on which the Foundation Company has much of its plant used in the repair work at the highway bridge. The masonry work on the pier is now several feet above water-level and water has been allowed to enter the coffer-dam. The span which was carried out by the ice last year has also been raised from the river-bed and brought ashore.

SQUEEZING THE PUBLIC

The Intercolonial Railway under Tory management continues to squeeze the public, both in freight and passenger rates. The freight rate on fuel wood from points along the Canada Eastern branch to this city has been given another boost. The rate on a carload of ten cords of furnace wood from Durham and Manzer's Sliding is now \$13.50, whereas the old rate was \$10.00. The increase means 35 cents added to the price of a cord of wood. Many people in this city burn wood for fuel and an extra tax of 5 cents on a cord is a serious matter to them.

TO ATTEND CONSECRATION

His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc and Rev. W. F. Chapman, V. G., left St. John last night on the Montreal train on their way to Ottawa to attend the ceremony of the consecration of Bishop-elect Brunet to the episcopate in the new diocese of Mount Laurier, (Ont.) The archdiocese of Ottawa has been divided into two distinct parts on account of the growth of the population, and a new bishopric has been established. His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc will not officiate in any way at the consecration ceremony, but he will be one of the most prominent figures in the sanctuary. His excellency the papal delegate will probably officiate.

TOBIQUE INDIAN
TRIED HIS HAND
AT SHOPLIFTING

Stephen Lockwood Bought One Revolver and Stole Another---Now in Jail Charged With Carrying Concealed Weapons

Stephen Lockwood, a Tobique Indian, was arrested Sunday at the St. Mary's Reserve on the charge of stealing a revolver from the hardware store of Lawlor & Cain Saturday night. The charge not being pressed in the police court this morning, it was dropped and the Indian was remanded to jail on the charge of carrying concealed weapons.

Lockwood went into Lawlor & Cain's shop Saturday night and priced some revolvers. He finally bought one and as it was being wrapped up for him, he put another revolver, valued at four dollars, in his pocket. On getting his purchase he left the shop. The other revolver was missed and one of the proprietors of the store, Mr. Cain, notified the police. The Indian had been noticed about the streets but by that time had disappeared. The police visited the St. Mary's Reserve but the man was not to be found there. On Sunday he appeared there, however, and was arrested.

When searched the stolen revolver and two others were found in his possession, giving rise to the charge of carrying concealed weapons. The stolen weapon was returned to the owners, who dropped the charge of theft. The other revolvers were confiscated.

Lockwood is a young man of good appearance.
