**LT. COL. C.W. BELTON
TO TAKE CHARGE OF
MILITARY HOSPITAL**

Mayor S. F. A. Wainwright Still Performing Duties However---Expected That Lt. Col. Belton Will be Sent to Another Station

There is a mixup in connection with the position of medical officer at No. 3 Station, Royal Canadian Regiment, in this city. Major S. F. A. Wainwright, 71st York Regt., who has been performing the duties for two years, is still filling the position although Lt. Col. C. W. Belton, Permanent Army Medical Corps, has arrived here from London, Ont., to assume the duties. Lt. Col. Belton, according to a despatch from Ottawa some weeks ago, has been transferred to No. 3 Station, R.C.R. He arrived here yesterday and today is looking for a house to rent. The mixup over the appointment is general. Rumor has it that Lt. Col. Belton was removed from the London Station to make room for a political appointment and Major Wainwright, who received his appointment to No. 3 Station under the present Dominion government, will not give it up without a vehement protest and is understood to have sufficient influence to hold it. Major Wainwright, when interviewed by The Mail today, stated that he was performing the medical duties at No. 3 Station and had not been notified of any change. Major A. C. B. Hamilton-Gray, officer commanding the station, said he knew that Lt. Col. Belton had arrived yesterday but that officially he was not aware that he was here at all. It is reported that Lt. Col. Belton has been sent here temporarily but will be transferred elsewhere after a time.

New Brunswick Will Lose One of its Foremost Citizens Next Month---Bought Property During Recent Trip to Coast

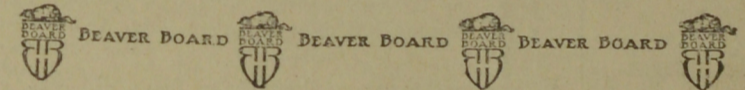
