TO REDEDICATE CONGRESS HALL

Philadelphia, Pa., Oct. 24—The dedication tomorrow of Congress Hall one of the most historic structures in Philadelphia, is to be made the occasion of the great patriotic demonstration. Recently the building has been restored to appear as it did when Congress held its sessions there during the latter years of the eighteenth century. President Wilson and several members of his cabinet, together with the government or other official representatives of the thirteen original States, will take part in the dedication programme. In addition to the literary exercises there will be a big military parade and the firing of a national salute by a squadron of warships stationed in the Delaware River opposite the city.
