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## NATIONALIST ALLIANCE STRONG

That the Chateaugay by-election was won by the Conservatives—not only by the use of money and other corrupt arguments familiar to the "Manitoba methods" of the Borden-Rogers government—but also by catching the remnants of the Nationalist vote with a cry against a Canadian navy is now plain. A couple of days before the election the riding was flooded with copies of a campaign sheet entitled "L'Opinion," which was issued by the Tory campaign organization and paid for with Tory money. Its main object was to make it appear that the Laurier naval policy was designed to offer Great Britain "a tribute of blood" from the Canadians and especially from the French-Canadians.

On the other hand this campaign imitation newspaper carefully instilled the impression that the Borden naval policy was one by which Canada's whole obligation to the Mother Country would be wiped out with an emergency present of \$35,000,000 and that thereafter there would be no fear of Canadians being plunged into naval preparations.

In 1911, Bourassa and his Nationalist followers, whose campaign was paid for by the Jingo-Tories of Montreal and Ontario, attacked the Laurier naval policy, declaring that it would mean conscription and the dragging of good French-Canadians to be disembowelled on British warships, fighting in foreign wars. In Chateaugay this policy was modified to a denunciation of the "tribute of blood" and an intimation that Mr. Borden's policy of sending a few million dollars to buy empty warships was the best way out of the problem of imperial defence.

The other main plank upon which this Tory-Nationalist campaign sheet plead for the Conservative candidate was patronage. An unblinking attempt was made to bribe the voters of the riding by pointing out the likelihood of plenty of government money and works if they would only defeat Hon. Mr. Fisher.

In the course of an appeal to the electors of Chateaugay on the alleged record of the government, this election sheet says:

"With regard to the ticklish question of Canada's participation in imperial defence, it (the Borden government) has given the proper solution in not refusing an emergency aid, but in making the metropolis thoroughly understand that any new concession on the part of Canada must receive its equivalent in representation in the councils of the empire.

"This attitude, at once firm and patriotic, has saved Canada's honor and prevented her from throwing herself, like the old European nations, into the ruinous gulf of armament."

## CCL. SAM'S GERMAN MENACE

On August 7, 1912, Col. the Hon. Sam Hughes made a speech at Vancouver, in which, with more zeal than discretion, he talked of "The Emergency." This is what Col. Sam Hughes had to say:

"Gentlemen, never underestimate your foes. . . . The great peril is from Germany? Why? Because Germany must have colonies, or within a generation or so she will begin to go down. She is building ships or borrowed money and must seek new territory. She has large numbers of citizens in the South American countries and there are only two fields where she can find the needed outlet for her surplus population. One is along the South American seaboard, the other is the British Colonies.

"Germany has to be taught a lesson and the lesson to be taught her is that Canada, South Africa, Australia and New Zealand are behind the Mother Country. We know that Germany was behind Kruger and that there was a definite scheme to oust Great Britain from South Africa."

There are also large numbers of people of German descent in Canada, who make a valued portion of our population. What do they think of a government which attempts to build up a naval scare on such flamboyant and studied insults to their Fatherland?

mand for New Brunswick tubers. He had shipped some to Boston, but at the present time he was shipping to New York, where better prices obtained.

Asked if he expected potatoes to advance in price in the near future, Ald. Boyce declared that if the demand for them from across the line kept up they certainly would advance. At the present time shippers are paying from \$1 to \$1.10 per barrel. Before the tariff changes went into effect potatoes were a drug on the market at 80 cents per barrel.

The potato crop in York and Sunbury counties this year is an exceedingly heavy one and the quality was never better. One hundred carloads of potatoes or twenty thousand barrels, shipped out of Fredericton in four weeks is a pretty good showing. It means nearly twenty thousand American dollars for the farmers of this section.

ted; the acceptance by Mayor Blankenburg; oration by Speaker Champ by the chaplain of the United States Senate.

The literary exercises were interspersed by musical features furnished by several military bands and a male chorus of one hundred voices. After the invocation the chorus sang "Hail Columbia," the national anthem written in Philadelphia and first sung here within a stone's throw of Congress Hall in 1798. At the conclusion of the ceremonies in the hall and as the procession of invited guests marched from the hall to Independence Hall, the band played "The Star Spangled Banner." At the same time a national salute was being fired by a squadron of United States warships stationed in the Delaware River opposite the city.
