NEWS OF FREDERICTON TWENTY ONE YEARS AGO

RETURNED—Mr. Edwin Ashford has returned from Boston. He was accompanied by his son Alfred, who was seriously injured in a railway accident there some months ago.

BARRISTERS—The following were sworn in barristers in the Supreme Court Thursday morning:—George H. V. Belyea, St. John; O. S. Crockett and George L. Wilson of this city, and Charles J. Milligan of St. John.

MARRIED—Rev. F. C. Hartley, pastor of the Free Baptist Church, and Miss Grace Yerxa, daughter of Mr. Ludlow Yerxa, were married on Wednesday morning. The ceremony was performed by the bridegroom's father, Rev. G. A. Hartley of St. John. The happy couple left by boat on a wedding tour.

SUCCESSFUL SPORTSMEN—Since the opening of the shooting season Harry Atherton of this city, has bagged something over sixty woodcock, besides numbers of partridges and snipe. TEACHER RESIGNS—F. P. Yors-ton has resigned his position as principal of the Charlotte Street School in order to become principal of the Newcastle School. Edwin T. He was a little out in his prognostications as when the votes were counted Mr. Blair and his ticket were defeated by five hundred majority. A fire-brand campaign waged by Herman H. Pitts over the Bathurst School question did the trick.

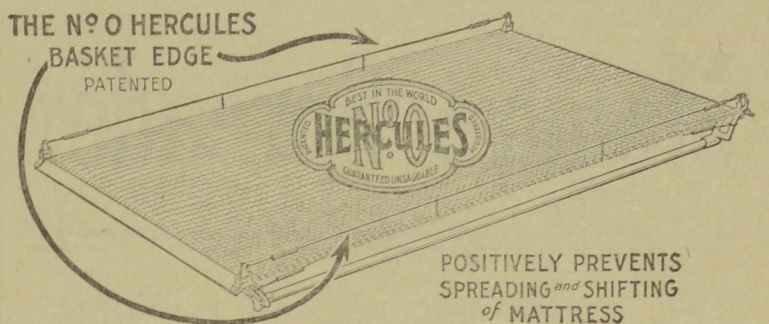
