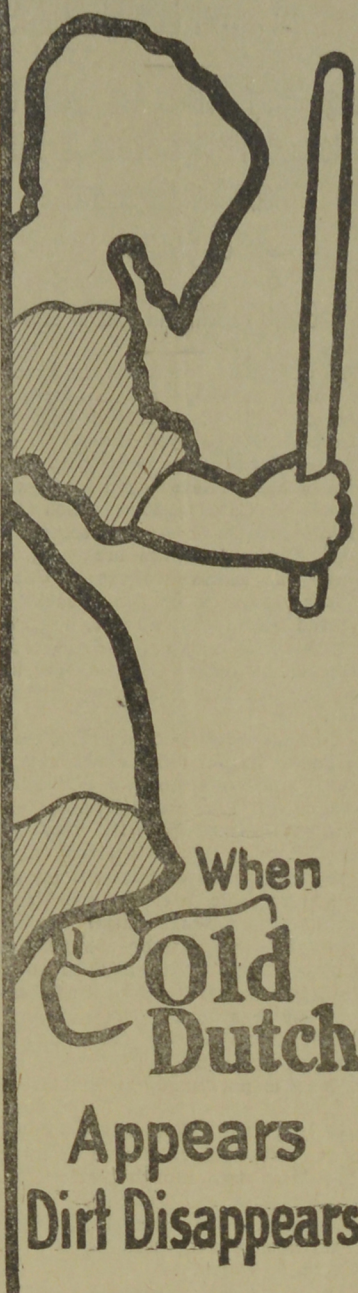

FRANK BOGASH JR.
WON \$2000 STAKE
AT DALLAS MEET

Tom Murphy Also Captured the Three-
Year-Old Trot With Sweet Spirit
---Good Racing

Dallas, Texas, Oct. 23—The New York trainer, Tom Murphy, shone at the State Fair races today, capturing the \$2000 stake for 2:07 pacers with Frank Bogash Jr., the leading money winning pacer of the season, and the three-year-old trot with the bay filly, Sweet Spirit.

Bogash was by far the best in the stalls, winning as he pleased in each heat, the Kansas mare, Minnie Chimes, being the only serious contender. Sweet Spirit also had an easy time in beating the three-year-olds, shutting all but Lady Elmhurst out in the first heat.

ENGLISH RUGBY LEAGUE POSSIBLE FOR UPPER CANADA

Game Shows Signs of Spreading and
Become Very Popular---Ottawa
People Interested

Montreal, Oct. 24—It is not at all unlikely that an Interprovincial Old Country Rugby League will be organized in Canada next year. The visit of the Montreal team to Ottawa on Thanksgiving Day worked wonders. The Rugby enthusiasts who witnessed this game were impressed with the style of play—the open spectacular work, which has made the game so popular in the Old Country.

The Montreal team had not left Ottawa before there was considerable talk of inaugurating an Interprovincial league next season. This, by the way, was the first time in several years that English Rugby had been played in the capital, and the enthusiasm that followed the game was very encouraging.

Since returning to Montreal, the local players have been talking considerably of the advisability of inaugurating an Interprovincial league next season. Ottawa is almost sure to enter a team, and efforts will be made to induce Toronto and other cities to enter the new league.

English Rugby is making great headway in Canada, just like soccer, and it is the belief of many adherents that it is destined, like soccer, to become one of Canada's most popular games.

In British Columbia and the Maritime Provinces, it is very popular. In fact, it is the only Rugby game played in these provinces. In British Columbia several unsuccessful attempts have been made to introduce the Canadian game, but without success.

SIX CUBS WILL NOT SIGN CONTRACTS FOR NEXT SEASON

Baseball Players Fraternity Having In-
fluence Upon Clubs---Serious
Trouble May Follow Incident

Chicago, Oct. 23—General Sherman once made a memorable remark about war. That big league club owners are to realize the truth of the statement before many more moons slip across the heavens became evident today, when it was learned that President Charles Welch Murphy of the Cubs, had already felt the stern and threatening hand of the Ballplayers' Protective Fraternity.

It is a well known fact that the organization of which David Fultz is the head has been preparing to make certain demands upon "organized baseball." The betterment of conditions under which players are held in "bondage" is the aim of the fraternity.

Cub players whose contracts expired this season have refused to listen to pleas from Murphy to sign. The mere fact that six refused to sign at this early date is no reflection on Murphy. He is only one of the many club owners who will find themselves up against the same proposition.

The players don't want to be tied up with contracts before they see what action the big leagues intend to take when the demands of the fraternity are presented. The formal presentation is to take place at the annual meetings of the leagues.

The players of all clubs bound themselves to this agreement by their signatures. If the magnates refuse flatly to consider a revision there is likely to be trouble. Just how far the fight is carried is up to the players themselves, eighty-five per cent. of whom have already signed the agreement embodying proposed changes.

It is rumored that several owners have signified a willingness to meet the fraternity half way.

Big Shipment of Foxes

Seventy five foxes of the black, silver and crossed varieties, were shipped in one car from Prince Albert, Sask., to Mr. F. E. Williams of St. John, N. B. One end of a large express car was completely filled with the living freight which was placed in crates for the long journey to the fox farms of Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick. The foxes represented a value of upwards of \$50,000.

Gus T. Kirby Makes Radical Proposal
Re Athletics---Further Airing of
Views Expected

New York, Oct. 23—One of the most sensational statements ever made in relation to the amateur athletics of the United States was the pronouncement of Gustavus T. Kirby, president of the Amateur Athletic Union, before the Philadelphia Columbia Alumni Association, that professional and amateur runners and athletes of all kinds should be permitted by rule to compete against each other.

The matter will be taken up at the next meeting of the Amateur Athletic Union, where it is expected Mr. Kirby will further air his views.

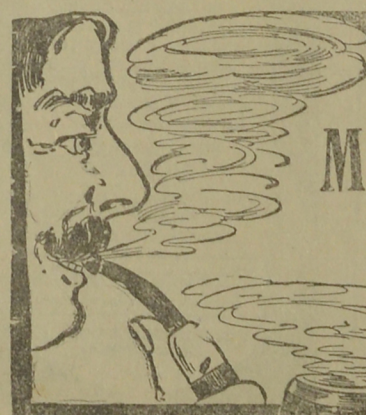
"I believe," said Mr. Kirby, "that under special circumstances competition should be permitted between individuals where one is an amateur and the other a professional, such as, for instance, a match race between Mr. John Paul Jones, the amateur mile champion, and a professional who believes he can run the distance faster."
