Pork sold at 11 and 12 cents and lamb for \$1 and \$1.25 per quarter. Apples were plentiful and brought 75 cents and \$1 per barrel.

ANDRE REBCHANUK,  
YOUNG RUSSIAN  
KILLED ON RAILWAY

Funeral This Afternoon---His Companion Says He Left Camp to go to the City at 5.30 in Evening

The name of the young Russian who was killed by a train Thursday night about a mile and a half east of Barker's Point was Andre Rebchanuk. He belonged to the Province of Minsk, Russia, and is survived by a widow and one child, living there. He was between twenty-five and thirty years of age and had come from Russia last spring to work on the Fredericton & Grand Lake Railway for A. E. Tritts & Son, contractor.

Detective James Roberts of the Fredericton police force, went to Little River yesterday and found the man who last had been with Rebchanuk before his death. This is a young Russian named John Petch. The latter with a delegation of about twenty Russians who were friends of the deceased, came to the city this morning to attend the funeral which took place this afternoon, with the rites of the Roman Catholic church.

Sam Shepherd of this city, who acts as interpreter for many of the foreign laborers, says that Rebchanuk came to him Tuesday and told him that a letter from his wife stated that money remitted to her in July last through the post office, had not been received. Petch was with Rebchanuk and the two accompanied Shepherd to the post office, where information concerning the missing money was given at the money order department. The two Russians then parted company with Shepherd. Petch says that he and his friend bought a drink of beer and

RECORD POTATO  
SHIPMENTS FROM  
YORK COUNTY

Ald. W. W. Boyce Has Disposed of One Hundred Carloads This Month---Demand for N. B. Tubers Increasing in U. S. Market

"My potato shipments for this month have broken all records," remarked Ald. W. W. Boyce to The Mail this morning. "I have already shipped away one hundred carloads, a few to Cuba and the rest to the United States. It is the greatest month's business I have ever had. I would like to have a breathing spell for a few days but there doesn't seem to be much chance of getting it."

Ald. Boyce went on to say that he was a Conservative in politics but he was a firm believer in reciprocity. He declared that the farmers of New Brunswick could raise produce as good as any in the world, but they have got to have a market for it. Now that the tariff barriers had been partially removed by the United States government, a great difference is shown in our export trade and it promises to reach enormous proportions.

Ald. Boyce went on to say that the Acrostook potato shippers, in anticipation of the changes in the tariff, had rushed large quantities to the Boston market but notwithstanding this fact, there was a great demand.
