AVERAGE MILK YIELDS

Could be Greatly Increased by Proper Testing of Cows

A common question in the country is, "How are the cows doing?" What a volume of thought that suggests! If they are doing well it is because of good feed and careful attention, or may it be despite the feed and care they deserve, but do not get? Leaving aside the questions of weather, breed, heredity and persistency of flow of milk, is it possible to account for the remarkable differences in yield that are to be found? For instance, the dairy division at Ottawa found in one locality 100 cows that gave 3,000 pounds of fat in one month, but 100 cows close by in the same county gave only 2,500 pounds of fat. Another lot of 100 cows in a nearby county gave only 2,200 pounds.

Is the ordinary herd keyed up to the pitch of creditable performance, or is it just joggling along in the old rut of "average yields?" Suppose the farmer ascertains his herd is doing "about as well" as his neighbor's, does it not seem a great pity that his ambition should end there?

Cow testing has helped many communities to far larger banking business, because it shows that scores of cows and average herds can be made to produce far more than they do at present. Make each cow pay a good profit.

A potato poultice is a good cure for toothache. Bake three or four nice-sized potatoes in their skins, and when done break them into a flannel bag and hold it to the face while very hot.

THE DAINTY "FLIPPER"

A Delicacy in Newfoundland Associated With the Sealing Season

A dainty peculiar to Newfoundland which so far has received little attention is the seal's flipper or flipper which is the paw with which the seal propels itself through the water. It is esteemed by the people of the Island as one of their greatest delicacies. A flipper weighs about a pound, and when the seal ships begin to arrive in St. John's most people begin to talk about securing "a meal of flippers." Small boys and others swarm about the steamers, and the crews are importuned to supply these dainties to all who ask for them. In the olden times they were given away freely, but latterly it is not uncommon for fifty cents a gad (six on a string) to be asked for them, while many among the crews now make a practice of salting quantities into barrels for their own consumption during the summer. A fresh flipper makes a most appetizing meal. The method of cooking them is to wash them thoroughly in fresh water, then soak them in water in which salt has been dissolved; next transfer them to a baking pan or pot with slices of pork or bacon, and after being cooked over a hot fire they are as delicate of flavor and taste as the finest of veal.

Among all the capitalists in St. John's interested in the sealing industry, flipper suppers, with the accompaniment of champagne, etcetera, are the invariable rule as the ships come in, and owners, captains, and others indulge annually in these repasts at some of the hotels or inns near the city. Very many family parties also partake of the unusual dish, and among the poorer classes flippers are looked upon as a great and welcome luxury, a change from the usual dietary and one that is beyond all question nourishing and healthy. Roman Catholics likewise patronize flippers largely because, as the seal is an amphibious animal, it is not meat, and may be eaten during the Lenten season or on fast days. All round the north and west coasts, where the seals are often taken close in shore, they are a recognized item in the daily menu—not alone flippers but the carcasses as well. These are perhaps even more appetizing than the flippers because there is less fat permeating them, but, of course, space is too valuable aboard the ship to allow of carcasses being brought home for consumption, they being worthless for any other purpose, and seal pelts being valued at \$100 a ton dead weight.

Light of Fireflies

It has been proved by experiments conducted by M. Ives, a chemist, that the light emitted by fireflies, glow-worms and other insects is purely chemical and not in any way biological. Mr. Ives finds that this light is not extinguished by death. Of course after death some stimulus is necessary to excite it, but it can be produced in their tissues two years after their death, which makes certain that it is chemical in origin.

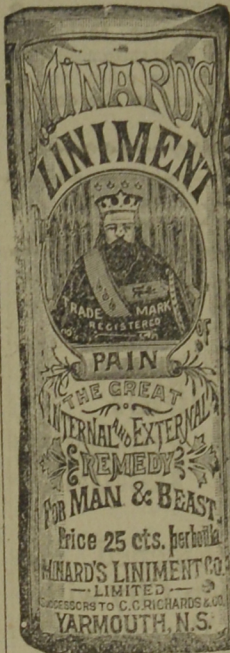
