INCONSPICUOUS CLOTHING

Dark Blue and Green Can be Seen the Farthest

Some curious and rather unexpected results have followed experiments in Europe for the purpose of determining what color in a soldier's uniform is the least conspicuous to an enemy. Of ten men, two were dressed in light grey uniforms, two in dark grey, two in green, two in dark blue, and two in scarlet. All were then ordered to march off, while a group of officers remained watching them. The first to disappear in the landscape was the light grey, and next, surprising as it may seem, the scarlet. Then followed the dark grey, while the dark blue and the green remained visible long after all the others had disappeared. Experiments in firing at blue and red targets, according to same experiments, proved that blue could be more easily seen at a distance than red.

It may be that khaki, which is the fashionable color now for army uniforms, will have to give way to grey, for in these days of long-range weapons inconspicuous clothing is vitally necessary for soldiers.

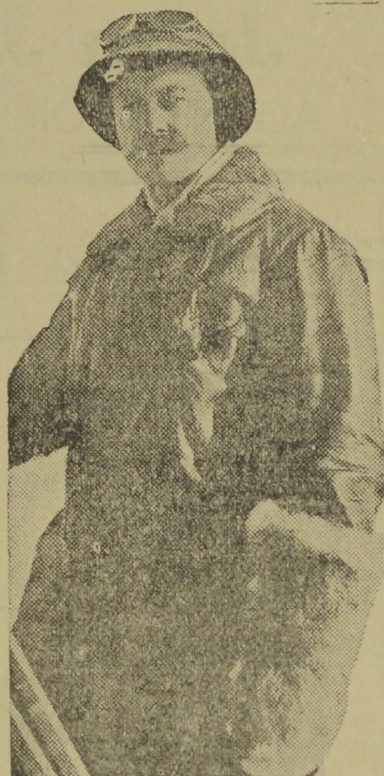

THE BLONDE ESKIMOS

Northern Trapper Claims to Have Seen Them Before Stefansson

A far northern trapper, G. L. Deschanbeault, returning from Fort Simpson to Edmonton, challenged the claim of Explorer Stefansson that he was the first discoverer of the blonde Eskimos.

Some two and a half years ago Deschanbeault on a hunting expedition accompanied by Joseph and William Hudson camped on the Copper Mine River, seven hundred miles north of Fort Simpson. While in camp the Eskimo interpreter informed Deschanbeault that strange stories were being told among his companions about another tribe of "Huskies" who, although they resembled the ordinary Eskimos in their habits, had the pale faces of the white man.

Pled by curiosity, Deschanbeault decided to follow the Copper Mine River to its juncture with the Great Bear Lake. On arriving at the shores of the Great Lake, the little party came upon the encampment of the strange tribe. The Eskimos were dressed after the customary fashion of natives of the north, but instead of being squat of stature and dark were fair haired and of light complexion.

BRITISH INFLUENCE IN SOUTH AFRICA

Intermarriage Lessens Hate—English Literature Over-runs the Country

Mr. B. Ryan, of East London, South Africa reports that a great deal of intermarrying is taking place between Briton and Boers, that the country is being over-run by light literature all of which is published in English and the children become absolutely English. While the Dutch do not like the other race at the present time the country is surely becoming British in spite of Boer prejudice and customs.

Mr. Ryan then explained why South Africa was bound to be British to the end. Although the Government had spent a million and a half pounds on a magnificent Parliament building at Pretoria, evidently with the object of keeping it in the old Transvaal capital, Johannesburg with her 300,000 people and the Rand with its gold production of \$300,000,000 per annum, will be in connection with the British influence in Cape Colony the ever-growing predominating power in the South African Confederation.

DEMONSTRATION FARM

NEAR DOAKTOWN

Doaktown, N.B., Sept. 28—Kenneth H. Fiske of the staff of the Conservation Commission, Ottawa, has been in the vicinity for several days making a farm survey with the idea of establishing one of the demonstration farms being conducted by the commission in all parts of Canada.

The agricultural possibilities of Northumberland were strikingly demonstrated at the recent Chatham exhibition and the attention of departmental authorities has been attracted by the excellent display. It is something of coincidence that Mr. Fiske's brother, S. M. Fiske of Florenceville, N.B., is also in the county on a similar commission, acting as judge in the field crop competition.

Discussing the report sent out regarding the potato crop in Alhama, Ont., yielding 400 bushels to the acre, Mr. Fiske said this hardly surpassed the crops which he had seen here, as one of the winning farms turned out eighteen good potatoes to the hill.

TO PROBE TIM SULLIVAN'S DEATH

New York, Sept. 29.—A large number of witnesses (have been summoned to testify at the inquest into the death of Representative Timothy D. Sullivan, known throughout the city as "Big Tim," which was begun by Coroner Healy today. Mr. Sullivan had been suffering for about a year with some mental disease which made him mentally irresponsible and after having been kept in a sanatorium for some time his brother, with an attendant, took the patient to Europe in the hope that the trip would benefit his condition. After their return this summer, Mr. Sullivan seemed to be somewhat improved, but one day he disappeared under peculiar circumstances and nothing was seen or heard of him in spite of the most thorough search, until his mangled body was found at a railroad crossing in the Bronx borough. Persistent rumors that "Big Tim" had been foully dealt with and that after he had been murdered his body had been placed upon the railroad track, induced District Attorney Whitman to start an investigation and it was decided to hold an inquest.
