THAW WILL CALL

Dist Atty Edward A. Conger has been out of town since early Saturday morning, but at the last moment before departing for Albany on an unknown mission stood pat on the matter of an indictment, saying that the only statement he could make was that the Thaw case had been presented to the Grand Jury and that the jury had not yet reported on it. It is generally understood here that the Grand Jury voted against indicting Thaw.

RELIEVED AT ABSENCE

Concord: N. H. Sept. 28.—William Travers Jerome has not yet reached Concord, and now that the Governor has extended the time for the filing of the brief by the defense to Oct. 6 it is not believed that he will come to the city before that time. It was learned today that from New York on Saturday Jerome went to Williamstown, Mass., to get his motor car, and from there drove to his summer place in Connecticut.

His failure to show up has brought great relief to the Thaw attorneys, and they are now declaring that Jerome must take good on his conspiracy charge by producing an indictment, or else lose the fugitive. The general impression elsewhere is also to the same effect. Unless Jerome gets favorable action from the Dutchess County Grand Jury the refusal of the Governor to sign the papers would not create much surprise.

Thaw has passed the day quietly in his room at the hotel. He is suffering from a heavy cold and a bothersome cough, and the latter served to keep him awake the most of the night. He was not feeling in the best of shape this morning and for that reason denied himself to practically all callers. He devoted the day to disposing of his mail and in reading. Merrill Shurtleff, of his New Hampshire staff of counsel, accompanied by his wife, motored down from Lancaster and was in conference with his client for some time this morning.

COLD STORAGE DINNER FOR SCIENTISTS

Chicago, Sept. 30.—The fifteen hundred or more scientists from all parts of the United States, France, Germany, Belgium, Austria, Russia and the South American Republics who are in attendance at the third International Congress of Refrigeration which has been in session here for a week, are looking forward with somewhat mixed feelings to the big banquet to be given in their honor tonight. As a rule the only thing to be dreaded at a banquet are some of the speeches which seem to be the unavoidable concomitant on such occasions and which are apt seriously to interfere with the enjoyment, if not with the digestion, of the good things prepared for the feasters in the way of food. On this occasion, however, there is another cause for misgivings. According to previous announcement every bit of the food to be served at the banquet tonight will be from the cold storage description and nothing will be used in the preparation of the banquet that has not been in cold storage for at least seven months. It is true that the scientists attending the congress are all ardent advocates of refrigeration but while preaching refrigeration is comparatively simple and easy, it requires a considerable amount of heroism deliberately to sit down at a banquet table and consume formidable quantities of cold storage food.

REAL ESTATE ADVANTAGES

It is understood that land values in Fredericton have advanced considerably during the past summer and will advance further. Owners of large properties on the outskirts of the city which will have to be used for building purposes as the city grows, are already refusing offers to buy and are holding out for higher prices.

The present race course is leased to the Fredericton Park Association by the Odell Estate and it is freely predicted that the lease will not be renewed when the present lease runs out, which will be shortly.

COTTON MEN IN SESSION

Atlantic City, N.J., Sept. 30.—Mayor William Riddle of Atlantic City and Hon. Joseph W. Salus, president of the Atlantic City Business League, delivered addresses welcoming the visiting members of the National Association of Cotton Manufacturers after the association had been called to order this morning for its ninety-third annual meeting. Edwin Farnha, Greene, the president of the association, responded and at the conclusion of the session a reception was tendered to the visiting members and their ladies. The convention will continue until and including Thursday and many subjects of importance to cotton manufacturers will be discussed at the daily sessions. Many of the papers scheduled to be read before the convention deal with purely technical matters of interest only to those engaged in the manufacture

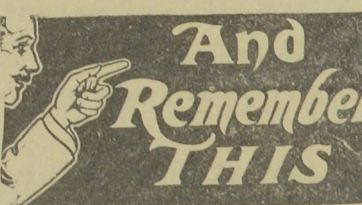
