WOMEN SCRAPPED AT BALLGAME IN MARYLAND

Sport Taken Very Seriously in South
---Close Race in George's Creek
League Made Trouble

Cumturland, Md., Sept. 28.—The baseball game today at Midland between Cumberland and Midland, in the George's Creek League, was marked by a series of disturbances and the 2500 spectators were in frequent mix-ups in which women proved to be even more aggressive than men.

Until today Cumberland led the league in the race for the pennant. Frostburg played Piedmont today and won, while Cumberland lost to Midland, giving Frostburg first place.

The first wrangle occurred in the second inning when C. Lippold of the Cumberland team, was struck. In the sixth inning Manager Nelson W. Russer of Cumberland, was hit during a dispute. In the meantime a turmoil ensued in the grandstand, where women were fighting constantly.

Two women belabored each other for almost half an hour and men were unable to separate them. They scratched each other and used handbags as weapons.

Four separate fights occurred in the grandstand.

Both Wolgast and Nelson fought several battles in Milwaukee before they became champions but neither has appeared in the ring here since.

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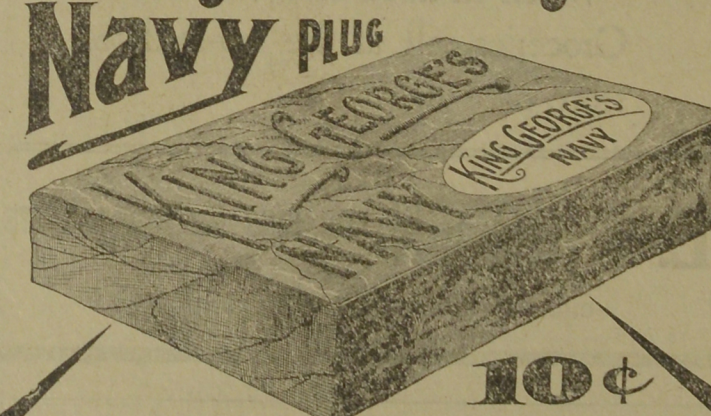
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
