LITTLE BOY

**SERIOUSLY HURT
LAST EVENING**

Edward McGoldrick While Playing Near His Home, Charlotte Street, Fell on Street--Feared Neck Was Broke

Edward Francis McGoldrick a little boy whose home is at the corner of Regent and Charlotte streets, sustained severe injuries yesterday afternoon about four o'clock when he fell upon the street opposite his home while playing with other children. He was being chased by his brother and tripped and fell headlong into the gutter. The force of the fall was sufficient to stun him and it was feared that he had broken his neck. Dr. Weaver and Dr. Holden were summoned and attended the lad. His appearance caused his mother great alarm the blood gathering in his face and fingers and turning them dark. The boy was restored to consciousness, however, and today is reported to be improving.

Last evening several stories which arose from this accident were in circulation about the city. The most startling was that two boys had been wrestling in the Old Protestant Burying ground and one had thrown the other breaking his neck.

STREET SYSTEM

**BEING EXTENDED
CONSIDERABLY**

Scully and McLeod Streets Now Being Opened--Argyle Street Expected to be Built Up Next Summer

The street systems of the city is being considerably enlarged this fall and further enlargement is expected next spring. The Scully's Grove property of the New Brunswick & British Colonization Company is being opened up now. Scully and McLeod streets run through this property from Regent to St. John streets. Road Commissioner H. C. Jewett has had McLeod street ploughed out through its entire length. Scully street has been treated the same way for about half its length. To complete this street it will be necessary to cut out part of the grove of magnificent pines which gave the property its name. The trees hardly will be cut this autumn. Both Scully and McLeod streets are to be turnpiked and St. John street is to be extended along the northwestern side of Queens Square to meet McLeod street. The extension of St. John street will make it necessary to rectify it near the corner of Aberdeen street, where residential property encroaches upon the street several feet.

Scully's Grove has seen its last day as an athletic field. The fences are now torn away for the opening of the streets. One house facing St. John street extension is in course of erection and another dwelling is to be removed from the southern side of the property to about the centre.

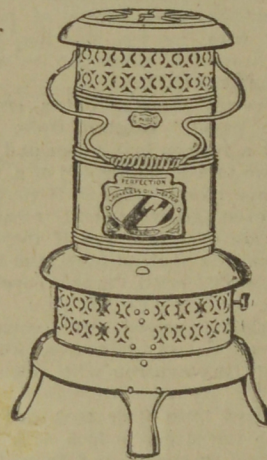
