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A CHANGE OF TUNE

One of the most uncompromising opponents of reciprocity two years ago was Mr. James Carruthers, a prominent Montreal capitalist. He is financially interested in Canadian flour mills and claimed that reciprocity would be fatal to the milling industry of this country. Since the new United States tariff went into effect however, he has completely changed his tune, judging by the following interview which he recently gave out in Winnipeg:

"I cannot see," said James Carruthers recently, "why Canada should not remove the countervailing duty on wheat if the United States will enter into a reciprocal arrangement and admit our wheat free of duty. We have everything to gain by such a proposition and nothing to lose. There might, perhaps, be a little winter wheat come into Canada from the south in season, but not enough to appoint to anything."

"The more markets we can get for our wheat the better for us and I am speaking now on behalf of the farmers. I cannot see for the life of me where we would lose anything by extending our market for wheat."

In making the statement attributed to him Mr. Carruthers practically repeats the very arguments which the Liberals used in 1911 in support of reciprocity. Mr. Carruthers took the opposite view at that time but has evidently arrived at the conclusion that he was wrong and he is honest enough to say so. There is not the slightest doubt in the world that there are hundreds of men all over the country who were influenced by the loyalty cry of the Tories in 1911 and voted to kill reciprocity against their better judgment, who would gladly support it today if they had the chance. Why, only a few days ago a prominent millman and produce dealer of a Nashua parish, who is a Conservative, admitted in conversation with The Mail, that the arguments used by his party in this country against reciprocity two years ago were ridiculous in the extreme.

A delegation of Tory members from the west have been Ottawa urging the government to put 'wheat and flour on the free list so that Canada may get rid of the countervailing duty on these commodities entering the United States. Surely the Borden government is not going to play into the hands of the fourteen American railways, which 'according to Hon. George E. Foster, "have their snouts up against the Canadian border" ready to turn the arteries of our trade southward.

Since the new United States tariff went into effect many thousands of barrels of potatoes have gone from New Brunswick to the United States. The price has advanced from eighty cents per barrel to \$1.10. Will some Tory Flag Flapper rise and tell us what price potatoes 'would have been bringing in York County today if the United States government had retained the duty of sixty two and one half cents per barrel. Come now, don't all speak at once.

Tory newspapers and politicians are constantly declaring the new United States tariff is giving Canada all the benefits we would have got under reciprocity and we are not asked to give anything in return. The new tariff is providing the farmers of this country with a market for their products, but the do nothing Borden government is entitled to no thanks for it.

Some Tories are attributing the Liberal victory in South Bruce to the bellicose utterances of Col. Sam Hughes on the German peril. Probably if Col. Sam has his way the Germans of South Bruce who voted against the Borden naval policy will be taught a lesson.

Where are the great and wise patriots who two years ago advised the farmers of York to have no truck or trade with the Yankees. They are filling government jobs of one kind or another.

At last accounts the farmers of York, although shipping hundreds of barrels of potatoes to the United States, were still loyal British subjects.

It is said that Premier Borden has gone to Virginia in the United States of America, to prepare his permanent naval policy.

(Continued from page eight.) have also been frozen in the fields, the weather in October having been so unfavorable that many farmers were unable to harvest the crop. In the Argostock country losses from frost to farmers are estimated to aggregate one million dollars.

With the development of a market for New Brunswick potatoes in the United States it is expected that modern frost-proof potato warehouses will be built in this province and as Fredericton is the centre of a large potato-growing district, this city probably will be the location of several such warehouses. There is also a demand for heated cars for shipment and with the development of the trade these will come.

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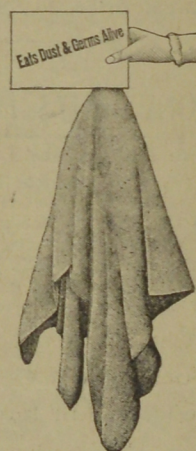
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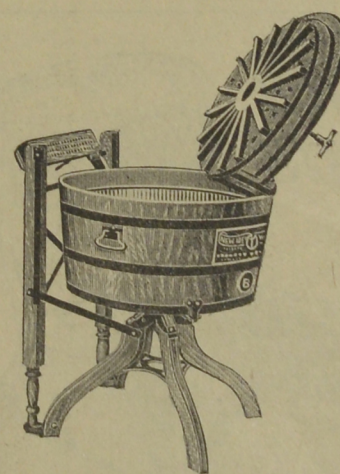
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
