## GUARANTEE IN CONNECTION WITH FILTRATION PLANT

Company Which Installed It Liable to Suit if it is Not up to the Standard of Efficiency Claimed

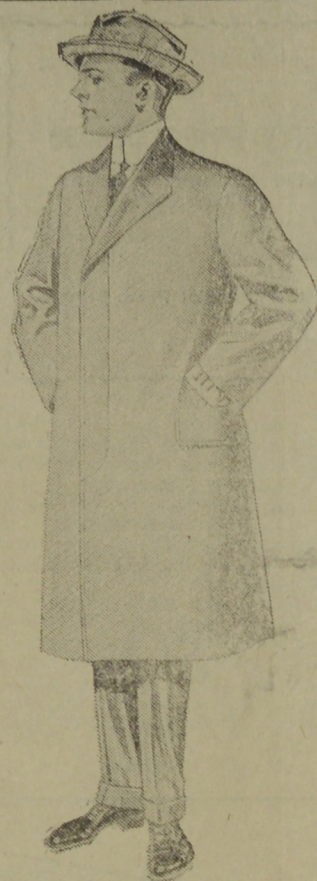
The Mail has been informed by Ex-Mayor C. F. Chestnut, that the city at the time the Filtration Plant was installed received from the New York Consolidated Jewell Filtration Company a guarantee of efficiency to the extent of removing 99 percent of impurities from the raw water. If the percentage of efficiency cannot be obtained through defect in the plant the company is liable to suit. This fact is of considerable importance in view of the present controversy concerning the efficiency of the Filtration Plant. Ex-Mayor Chestnut was a member of the committee of the City Council which made the arrangements for the installation of the plant and in company with consulting engineer F. A. Barbour of Boston whose services were secured by the city at the time the plant was installed, inspected some up-to-date filtration plants in the United States.

Speaking of conditions under which it was decided to install the Filtration Plant Ex-Mayor Chestnut stated to a Mail reporter that Engineer Barbour had informed the City authorities plainly that the plant must be operated by a competent person or it would be a source of a greater danger than the use of unfiltered water on account of a sense of false security which would be given.

After the Filtration Plant had been in operation for some time Engineer Barbour informed Ex-Mayor Chestnut that the plant under the system of operation had not been as efficient as it might have been having reference to the fact that coloring matter was not removed from the water.

In Mr. Chestnut's own opinion a city engineer should be appointed to have charge of the Filtration Plant as well as other city departments. That plant being one of which technical knowledge is required and not the knowledge of a so-called practical man. Ex-Mayor Chestnut stated also that popular opinion was very generally in error with regard to the Filtration Plant in the supposition that aluminum sulphate was put into the water and was contained in it as it came through the mains. This he said appeared to be a feature of the general tendency to "knock" the filtration system.

FACILITIES FOR SHIPPING POTATOES ARE LACKING

Frost Has Done Much Damage in This Section as Result--Proper Cars Difficult to Obtain

Lack of facilities to ship, handle and store the potato-crop of this part of New Brunswick, has been keenly felt by the farmers, particularly during the recent cold weather. Heavy losses by frost have been reported. At Canterbury three thousand bushels stored in a hay-shed were frozen and will be a total loss to the owner, a shipper of Houlton, Me. On the Gibson Branch of the C.P.R. similar losses have occurred, some potatoes having been touched by frost while in cars. Potatoes

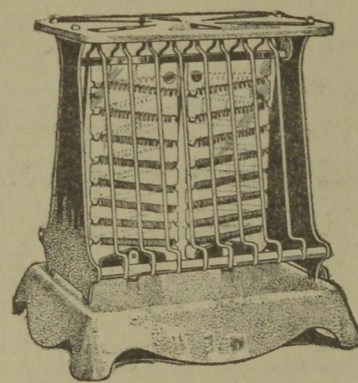
