BISHOP'S CHARGE  
NOW BEING DISCUSSED  
BY ANGLICAN SYNOD

Bishop of Huron Preached Synod Sermon to Large Congregation Last Night--Proposal Re Incapacitated Clergy Fund

The Anglican Synod this morning took up the consideration of the charge of His Lordship Bishop Richardson and some interesting discussion took place before the Synod adjourned at 1 p. m. to reassemble at 2.30 in the afternoon. After the bishop had delivered his charge some business was transacted before the Synod adjourned.

Last night there was a large congregation at Christ Church Cathedral when His Lordship the Bishop of Huron delivered the Synod sermon.

After His Lordship's address was delivered it was referred to the standing committee.

Rev. H. T. Parlee, of the diocese Nova Scotia, formerly of this diocese, was invited to take a place in the house.

Rev. Walter P. Dunham was elected assistant secretary. Reports of boards and committees were presented and on motion of Archdeacon Forsythe were received and taken at read.

This morning there was a long discussion on the proposal to change the canon regarding the Incapacitated Clergy fund. It is desired to have this fund used for superannation purposes as well. Legislation to give the Synod the power must be secured.

The bishop's charge was also discussed. That section recommending an increase of \$100 per year in the stipends of the clergy was under discussion when the synod adjourned.

BY-LAW AGAINST  
FORESTALLING RETAINED  
ON MAYOR'S VOTE

City Council Discussed Market By-Law at Length Last Evening --Ald. Rogers' Resolution Divided Board Equally

The City Council came very near to legalizing forestalling in the city market at last night's session. It was only by the casting vote of Mayor Hooper that the present bylaw in regard to forestalling was retained, the Aldermen dividing five to five on a resolution by Ald. Rogers that the section of the market bylaw forbidding forestalling be repealed.

"I am very glad to be able to vote against the resolution said His Worship as he declared the motion lost. Ald. Rogers introduced the matter and moved that the section of the market bylaw prohibiting grocers, butchers, etc., from purchasing in the city market before the hours of 10 a. m. be repealed.

Ald. Everett seconded the motion. The latter did not exactly meet his views but a change of some kind should be made.

Ald. Clark said he believed in the greatest good to the greatest number. He felt that householders should have an opportunity to purchase produce in small quantities from the farmers. Any change would be objectionable. The market was becoming more popular.

Ald. Osborne stated that the market had come to be very well regulated and well patronized. He felt that the market bylaw should remain as it was and he hoped the time would come when there would be better market accommodation. There was

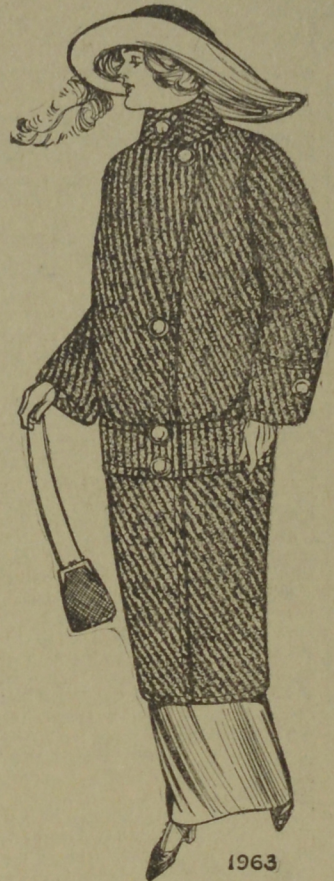

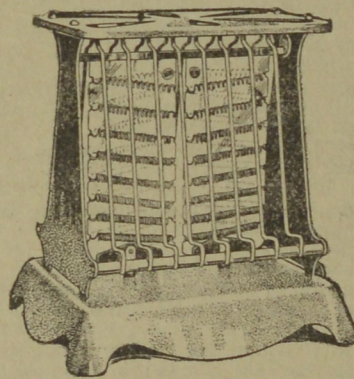
