 SOME CONCRETE CASES.

If by this time the postmaster is not satisfied that there is something rotten in the state of Denmark, we would ask him to inquire into the following concrete cases of incompetency selected from a large number:

A short time ago a gentleman doing business on Queen street was notified by a relative of the same name that there was a box for him at the post-office. Said the relative: "They gave it to me but I told them it was for you and handed it back." The gentleman hastened to the post-office and asked for the box but was told that it was not there. A little later he met the relative who had broken the good news and told him that he must have erred when he said he had handed the box back as it was not in the office. The relative assured him that he had spoken the truth. It was not until the gentleman of the first part had met another relative who had also been given the box by mistake and returned it that he was able to get possession of it from the postal authorities.

Here is another case:

An insurance man some time ago sent a notice to a client that his policy would be due on a certain day but got no response. Thinking that there was something wrong he advanced the amount of the premium and kept the policy from lapsing. A few days later the client came in with the notice, which he said had been over a fortnight reaching him, although he is a resident of the city. Inquiry at the post-office disclosed the fact that the letter had been placed in an adjoining box belonging to a firm which had failed in business and had not been getting mail regularly.

Here is another sample brick:

A few days ago an important letter came to hand addressed to a sea captain who makes his headquarters here but who is at present absent from the city. Endorsed on the envelope was the rather interesting information that the party for whom the letter was intended was "not known in the sergeant's mess." The only person who imagined he was known there was the mutt who placed the letter in the wrong box.

Not long ago a professional man mailed a letter containing a check to a lady residing in the city. She never received it and was put to no end of trouble. After some delay a duplicate check had to be issued and the usual legal formalities had to be gone through with to indemnify the party issuing the check.

These are only a few sample bricks. The Mail has more of them and will give them to the public unless the postmaster stirs his stumps and makes an effort to have the post-office run under some proper system. There is no reason why an important city like Fredericton should not have a fairly decent system of mail delivery. As a prominent citizen recently expressed it, "Conditions at the post-office are becoming intolerable and it is about time that somebody got a hauling over the coals."

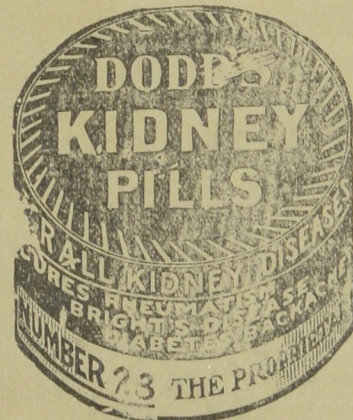
