ASK C. P. R. TO  
RETURN TO ATLANTIC  
STANDARD TIME

Board of Trade Executive Considers  
Matter of Importance to Travelling  
Public—Much Confusion Has Re-  
sulted From Change

The executive of the Board of Trade met last night in regular session. A considerable amount of routine business was transacted. A matter of great importance to the travelling public was considered, that being a suggestion that the C.P.R. return to Atlantic Standard Time in this province as far as the operation of its passenger trains is concerned. The Board of Trade executive already has communicated with the C.P.R. authorities, urging that the time-table be published with Atlantic Standard Time, which is in general use throughout New Brunswick.

Many instances have occurred of inconvenience resulting from confusion of Atlantic Time, which it is in general use, with Eastern Time, which is that by which the C.P.R. has been running its trains since last spring. The great majority of people do not remember that no actual change in the time of arrival and departure of trains but that the time shown in C.P.R. time-tables is one hour earlier than that in use here. The most notable instance of this confusion was at the time of the departure of the militia for Camp Sussex in June last when the troops were on the train an hour before it was due to leave.

The change in time system was made by the C.P.R. as a matter of greater convenience in operating. Eastern Standard Time being used on divisions west of New Brunswick. It is claimed that the former system
