



MUCH MONEY BET ON FREAK WAGERS

New York, Oct. 4.—Some lively betting on the world's baseball series took place yesterday, thousands of dollars being wagered at even money. The largest bet recorded was \$400 at even on the chance of the Giants, while one of \$500, similarly laid, was booked on the curb market.

At the cafe of Fred Schumm, No. 2 Stone street, many freak bets were recorded, including \$350 even that the Athletics win the first game; \$300 at even that the first day's combined score will be odd; \$80 to \$100 that Matty and Bender pitch the first game and \$50 even that Demaree wins the first game he pitches.

Although thousands of dollars were wagered, neither team was made favorite.

By far the greatest amount of money played in the first few days after the opening date was announced was wagered in so-called freak bets. There was no end of these. Reports from Chicago were that a bet could be had on anything pertaining to the games and the following were quoted as some of the odds given on bets made there.

Even money on the Giants and Athletics.

Two to one that Bender does not win one game.

Four to one that Bender does not win two games.

Seven to five that Mathewson does not win one game.

Three to one that Mathewson does not win two games.

Twenty-five to one that the series goes over four games.

Two to one that the series does not go seven games.

One hundred to one that the Giants do not win four straight.

One hundred to one that the Athletics do not win four straight.

In New York one bet has been recorded at odds of four to five that Mathewson would pitch the first game. Another bet was reported at even money that Demaree would win his first game. A third bet was that the series would go six games. This bet was also at even money. One Giant enthusiast offered one to four that the Giants would win the first three games but found no takers.

Infinite are the variations on which the early betters have laid their money. One man bet even money that the Athletics would make more runs during the total games than the Giants would. Another offered even money that the Athletics would lead in hitting.

In both New York and Philadelphia the usual plaint is heard that plenty of money was being offered on the home team without takers.

WINNIPEG MAN FALLS IN CONFIDENCE TRAP

New York, Oct. 6.—The police today threw out a drag net for wire-tappers who are said to have fleeced D. S. Curry, a retired business man from Winnipeg.

Curry is reported to have made a complaint to the police yesterday that he had been swindled out of \$64,000 by a group of wire-tappers.

These were said to have worked up a friendship with him and then taken him about two or three weeks ago to a house in West Forty-fifth street, where he was introduced to a "sure thing" in the way of a race. He lost all he bet, according to the report.



BUFFALO SPORTSMAN ON N. B. GAME LAWS

Dr. Wheeler Describes Hunting Trip to Miramichi With Guide Braithwaite

The October number of Rod and Gun in Canada, contains an illustrated article on "Moose the Swamp Hog of the Canadian est," from the pen of Dr. David B. Wheeler of Buffalo, N. Y. It describes a hunting trip to the Miramichi woods made by the author in company with Mr. Henry Braithwaite the veteran guide, of this city.

Dealing with the game laws and game protection in this province Dr. Wheeler says:

"The New Brunswick game laws while faulty in many particulars have achieved one essential of game protection, they have stopped mark at hunting and game protection protects when it closes the game markets. Braithwaite, although frequently at odds with the game wardens, has perhaps done as much for the enforcement of the game laws as any other man in the Province. He has done this unconsciously. His skill and faithfulness as a guide have drawn non-resident hunters from all over the English speaking world. Indeed, it is largely due to his influence that non-resident hunting has continued unbroken since the days when an English garrison occupied Fredericton. Now the money of non-resident sportsmen furnishes to the settlers the raison d'être for game protection. Moose meat is worth less than beef and costs more. So long as the frontiersman regards a moose as forty dollars' worth of inferior nation of the species. But let him beef he is indifferent to the extermination of a species that is the bait for a five hundred dollar sporting trip and he becomes the game warden's most efficient ally. The recognition of the fact that the non-resident hunter is the best friend the big game animals have, has placed New Brunswick foremost in the ranks of Canadian game preserves."

BANKERS BEGIN THEIR CONVENTION

Boston, Mass., Oct. 8.—Following two days of section meetings and other preliminaries, the regular sessions of the thirty-ninth annual convention of the American Bankers' Association were opened today with a record-breaking attendance of prominent bankers and financiers from every section of the country. Mayor John F. Fitzgerald and President Thomas P. Beal of the Boston Clearing House welcomed the visitors. Response was made by First Vice-President Arthur Reynolds of Des Moines. Following the exchange of greetings, brief exercises were held in memory of the late Charles F. Huttig of St. Louis, who was president of the association at the time of his death some months ago. At 11 o'clock Chairman A. B. Hepburn of New York introduced the report of the Currency Commission, which was followed by a spirited discussion.
