either by pressure or special consideration. If the government, through Gutelius, had made special arrangements which enabled the C.P.R. and Allans to change their destination, then there was discrimination against St. John. He differed from Senator Thorne in one respect. Mr. Thorne felt it wrong if the government permitted the I.C.R. to give rates which meant a loss to the government road.

DR. PUGSLEY'S POWER.

Dr. Pugsley went further. It was discrimination even if there was profit to the Intercolonial. The main question was: After the door had been left open by the government and the C.P.R. and Allans had selected St. John as the port from which they most advantageously could do business, did a government official make arrangements that induced the companies to change the port?

St. John did not want anything unreasonable but wanted fair play.

PREMIER BORDEN'S REPLY.

Opening, Mr. Borden said he appreciated the interest properly felt in St. John as represented by the delegation. It was a natural interest and had been placed before him in a very temperate and broad-minded manner. The evidence that the government had no disposition to discriminate against St. John or any other of the great natural ports was to be found in the steps being taken on the Atlantic and the Pacific properly to equip them. All was undertaken as a national work. No port was being equipped solely in its own interests.

The C.P.R., he said, had had an arrangement with the government for some time. In the present instance, as he understood it, the matter had been dealt with altogether as a business matter between the property officer of the C.P.R. and the general manager of the Intercolonial. He was sure the latter had not been inspired by any desire to discriminate against St. John or any other port, and he had not received any such suggestion from any member of this government.

He hoped to receive more data on the agreement with the C.P.R. at an early date and trusted that the situation, when more fully explained, would so present itself as to show no discrimination had been intended. He felt he was capable of looking at the matter from a broad viewpoint.

McLEAN TOIN IN FREDERICTON

Fredericton baseball fans are following the world's champion series with keen interest on account of the presence of a Fredericton man on the Giants' line-up. "Lan" McLean, or Jack McLean, as he is generally known here, who caught for New York today, was born on Regent Street, Fredericton, in the premises now used by the local labor council as its rooms. In eighteen hundred and ninety-nine, McLean, who had been living with his family in Boston since a young boy, came here and acted as catcher for the Fredericton Tartars, the famous semi-professional team then at its best. Next season he caught regularly for the St. John Roses, and occasionally for the Tartars. McLean had two hits in yesterday's game at Philadelphia and started the Giants' batting rally. He also did good work behind the bat.

FRANK BOGASH JR.

MADE ANOTHER RECORD

Lexington, Ky., Oct. 8.—Frank Bogash, Jr., lowered the world's record for the fifth heat today, when he won the Tennessee stakes, the free-for-all pacing feature on the Grand Circuit racing on the Lexington track, going a final mile in 2:03. The son of Frank Bogash won the first and second heats, but lost the third and fourth to Flower Direct. He came back strong in the fifth and won in drive by a narrow margin. The time in the third heat for this stake, 2:01, was within half a second of the record, and was the fastest mile of the year.

The 2:05 pace, of which two heats were raced Tuesday, resulted in a straight heat victory for Hal B. Jr. Branham Braughman being drawn before the start of the third heat.

The 2:22 trot also was a straight heat race, the winner being Jim Todd. Michigan Queen won the first two heats of the 2:08 pace and Walnut Grove took the third, the race going over until tomorrow.
