GENERAL BOTHA WARNS
AGAINST INTERFERENCE

London, Nov. 26.—General Botha, in a trenchant speech upon the Indian situation in Natal last night, made it clear that South African autonomy was to be respected as much as that of Canada, Australia, or New Zealand, and that interference on the part of his Majesty's Indian Vicerey, Lord Hardinge, in the matter, which is obviously domestic, would not be tolerated.

PHONES 4000 MILES BY
WIRELESS FROM HANOVER

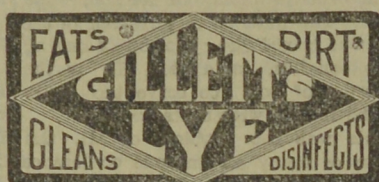
Berlin, Nov. 23.—The transmission of a wireless, telephonic communication over a distance of nearly 4,000 miles, from Neustadt-Am-Rudbenberg, in Hanover, to New Jersey, was accomplished on October 27 by a German wireless company, according to Rear-Admiral George August Emsmann, in a report yesterday to the German Shipbuilding Society.

The message was sent and received in the middle of the afternoon in spite of the daytime being most unfavorable for wireless communications. The two stations are over 800 feet high. Earlier attempts had proved that clearly-emitted tones were audible, and finally a spoken message was transmitted and distinctly received.

Emperor William and Prince Henry of Prussia have taken a great personal interest in the experiments.

Herr Bredow, director of a rival wireless company, at the same meeting described the German wireless telegraphic net. Hundreds of wireless despatches were passing daily, he said, from Mguen to Sayville, Long Island, and to Togoland, West Africa. Connections between Togoland and German South-West Africa are to be opened next year, and with East Africa in 1915, while communication between Samoa and New Guinea would be established in April next.

In the course of the discussion Herr Bredow said the prophecy made by Admiral Emsmann that wireless telephony would supplant wireless telegraphy would not be borne out, as telegraphy would always possess practical advantages.

FRENCH ACADEMY HELD
ITS ANNUAL SESSION

Paris, Nov. 27.—The French Academy held its annual public session "under the cupola" today. M. Rene Bazin delivered the discourse upon the "Prix de Vertu" and M. Etienne Lamy, the permanent secretary, presented his report on the literary competitions of 1913.

In accordance with the custom which requires that parts of the literary work to which the "Prix du Budget" was awarded be read before the Academy, M. Jean Richepin was chosen to read passages of the poem entitled "Le Rire d'Omphale" for which its author, M. Edmond Porcher, procurator of the Republic at London, received the award.

PUBLIC Notice is hereby given that under the First Part of Chapter 79 of the Revised Statutes of Canada 1906, known as "The Companies Act," letters patent have been issued under the seal of the Secretary of State of Canada, bearing date the 12th day of November, 1913, incorporating Albert James Gregory, barrister, John James Fraser Winslow, barrister, John Brunswick Gregory, manufacturer, Annie Elizabeth Rush and Annie Louisa Pinnamore, stenographers, all of the City of Fredericton, in the County of York, and the Province of New Brunswick, for the following purposes, viz:—(a) To prospect, search for, bore, mine, quarry, work, mill, refine, prepare for sale by any process, and to carry, sell and deal in coal, shales, oil shales, oilite, albertite, coke, gypsum, clay and other minerals or mineral substances, and generally to carry on the business and trades of mine and coal owners, iron masters, founders, smelters of metals, quarrymen, ore and metal dealers, oil and gas producers, manufacturers, refiners and dealers in any and all of the said commodities; (b) To purchase, lease or otherwise acquire any mines, mining rights, oil fields, oil wells, natural gas wells, quarries, lands, properties or any interest therein, suitable or convenient for any of the purposes of the company, and to explore, work, use or develop the same, and to sell, lease or otherwise dispose of the same or any part thereof; (c) To quarry, smelt, refine, dress, amalgamate or prepare for market by any process whatsoever, and market any ore, metal rock, shales, oil shales, natural gas or any other mineral or chemical substance of any kind, or any product or by-product thereof; (d) To purchase or otherwise acquire, construct, lay out, maintain, improve, manage, work, superintend or use, shafts, wells, plant, pipe lines, tanks, poles, wires, equipment, buildings, factories, furnaces, mills, crushing works, hydraulic works, machinery and works of all kinds, warehouses, reservoirs, roads, ways, bridges, tramways, water courses, tracks, railway sidings and railway connections or other facilities and equipment and conveniences for the mining, quarrying, developing, generating, collecting, producing, refining or otherwise treating, storing, transporting, transmitting, utilizing, marketing, selling or disposing of in any manner whatsoever, any of the products of the company; (e) To lay out, construct, purchase, lease or otherwise acquire, maintain, operate and manage steamships and vessels, piers, docks, dry docks, wharves, slips and all incidental structures, appliances and equipment; (f) To carry on any business which is incidental to the full use and enjoyment of the properties and works herein authorized, and to produce, manufacture, buy, sell and deal in merchandise and property of every description, and to carry on the business of general merchants and warehousemen, and to buy, sell, lease, rent and otherwise deal in and with, real and leasehold property, houses, dwellings, hotels, buildings and tenements; (g) To acquire by purchase or otherwise, or undertake the whole or any part of the business of any person or company carrying on any business in whole or in part, similar to any business which this company is authorized to carry on, or possessed of property suitable for any of the purposes of this company; (h) To acquire by purchase or otherwise and to hold shares in any railway company or in any company having objects altogether or in part similar to those of this company or carrying on any business capable of being conducted beneficially, directly or indirectly to this company. The operations of the company to be carried on throughout the Dominion of Canada and elsewhere by the name of "Atlantic Oilfields, Limited," with a capital stock of six hundred thousand pounds sterling, divided into 24,000 shares of twenty-five pounds sterling each and chief place of business of the said company to be at the City of Fredericton, in the Province of New Brunswick.

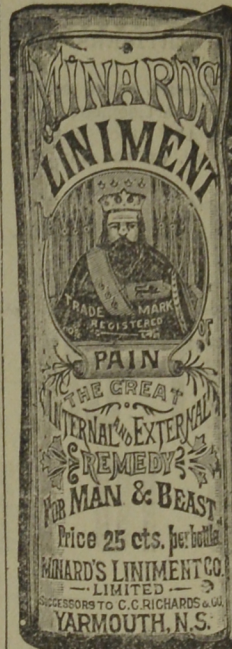
