### They Taboo Mirrors

There is a sect in Holland known as the Labadists, among whose members the use of mirrors is strictly prohibited. ### American Sponge Fisheries

## CANADIAN HOME INVESTMENT CO. REORGANIZED

Has Abandoned the Sale of Contracts and Will in Future Transact a Straight Loan and Investment Business

(Toronto Saturday Night.)

Advices from Vancouver make it clear that the Canadian Home Investment Company, the largest \$6 per month concern operating in Canada, has abandoned the sale of contracts. As stated last week, the corporation will be re-organized under the name of the Alpha Loan and Investment Company and will transact a straight loan and trust business, with headquarters at Vancouver. No final details have been as yet secured showing what will be done to protect the interests of contract-holders in the C.H.I.C. It is said that they may be given preferred shares in exchange for their contracts. Whatever the company enacts must be accepted by the contract-holders, because, as pointed out many times by Saturday Night, contract-holders have absolutely no voice in the conduct of the company. A group of gentlemen owning a handful of shares issued by the C.H.I.C. have complete control. The moneys deposited with the C.H.I.C. in the loan and reserve fund are company funds and are not now owned by those who so readily parted with their dollars. Were contract-holders the possessors of funds, they would naturally own all the assets. As it is, they would appear to have no legal status at all, save that they are probably preferred creditors. The relation they assume towards the C.H.I.C. now would appear to be that they are simply parties of the second part to a contract entered into between the C.H.I.C. and themselves under which the C.H.I.C. agrees to repay the sum of \$586 to each contract-holder at the end of eighty months. That contract has not, of course, had time to mature as yet, consequently the C.H.I.C. cannot be called upon to refund the above sum. Contract-holders might, in a body, demand the cash value of their payments from the C.H.I.C., but were they to make such a move they would in all probability find that the company has not nearly sufficient liquid assets to meet their claims. The C.H.I.C.—a million dollar concern with only a pittance of paid-up capital—has no surplus to its credit and if it had, commercial claims might wipe it out. Those who have been led astray into signing up with such concerns as the C.H.I.C. will find it profitable now to watch the outcome of the C.H.I.C. re-organization.

The Canadian Home Investment Company is a 'gone con,' so to speak. A year ago the financial editor of Saturday Night made an appeal to the minister of finance of British Columbia, asking that the British Columbia government forward from its archives certain returns made by the Canadian Home Investment Company, which figures, had they been published, would have helped to show the true character of the undertaking. The minister of finance saw fit to refuse the request, and the Province of British Columbia has issued charters to a score more of 'investment' concerns operating endless chains on the precise principle of that which has just gone to smash in the C.H.I.C. The way would appear to be clear for British Columbia to protect the citizens of its own province before other wrecks begin to accumulate. If Quebec shuts such corporations out, this will leave the Province of British Columbia almost alone in its readiness to allow operators of such companies to play fast and loose with the funds of its citizens. British Columbia should act, without fear or favor.

The following is a copy of the notice sent out to agents by the C.H.I.C., under date of November 1, 1913:

"Dear Sir:—In view of the fact that several of the provincial legislatures are not in sympathy with the plan of operation adopted and followed by our company, and especially as such inharmonious relations have developed in a condition that at the present time may be termed antagonistic, it has been deemed expedient to effect a re-arrangement of the concern's affairs. To this end the sale of contracts, for the present at least, will be discontinued, and you are instructed to give the usual ten days' notice dispensing with the valued services of your salesmen. This will permit of the using of these ten days by the salesmen for the writing of new business and the closing of business with present prospects."

"The superintendents will remain at their departments and make collections and attend to the company's business as usual, with the exception as noted above, i.e., the sale of contracts has been discontinued. As under these arrangements your earning power will be impaired, a salary at the rate of \$75 per month to date from November 1, 1913, will be paid

you. This letter is, and is to be considered by you, a modification of the agreement now existing between the company and yourself, only so far as the amount of your remuneration is concerned."

"The company will have one of its directors visit your office at an early date so as to arrange other matters that will permit of an opportunity of your earning a greatly increased remuneration. In the meantime there will be no interruption in the company's business, loans will be made as usual, as is well evinced in the fact that some thirty notices of loans already have been given within the past few days. All terms and conditions of the contract will be observed and the contract-holder given the fullest protection."

## TEACHERS OF JOURNALISM IN CONFERENCE

Madison, Wis., Nov. 27.—Instructors in Journalism connected with various colleges and universities throughout the country are gathering here in large numbers to attend the second meeting of the American Conference of Teachers of Journalism which will be held at the University of Wisconsin tomorrow and Saturday. Among the interesting subjects which are to come up for consideration and discussion is the plan for the establishment of a lecture bureau similar to that established by the associated advertising clubs in order to secure the services of well-known lecturers and writers to address the students of journalism in the various colleges and universities; the metropolitan paper as a means of giving students practical experience in summer time and methods of training students in agricultural journalism.

## A PERILOUS JOURNEY

Missionaries Make a Dangerous Trip in Northern Canada

Bishop Stringer of the Yukon once had quite a perilous journey from the mouth of the Mackenzie River to Dawson City. He was accompanied by another missionary and an Indian guide, who fell sick. Eventually they were obliged to bring the Indian back to the camp of his people, and set out alone.

Winter came on two weeks earlier than usual that year, and the two missionaries were frozen in some distance to the west of the divide. They decided to go across the mountains by a pass and proceed overland to the Peel River, so they set out with four days' provisions, a pair of light blankets, and some spare moose skin moccasins, after first hanging up their canoe out of the damp. A fog enveloped the Rockies, and they missed the pass. Consequently they had four distinct ranges to climb in the wind and fog, with the thermometer at times down to zero and below.

They traveled by compass, corrected by the North Star, the variation being the enormous difference of 45 degrees. Often they were forced to camp above the tree line on the slopes in the fog, cold, and wind, without fire and with but a light pair of blankets.

They eked out their food supplies by ptarmigan and rabbits supplied by the shotgun. The snow became so deep they were forced to stop and make snowshoes. They cut spruce saplings down into wands and steamed them into shape in their kettle. For webbing they filled them with an old fishnet, strings cut out from the uppers of their worn out moose moccasins and strips of blanket.

Twenty-eight days they were on that awful journey. Before they finished they had boiled and eaten their Eskimo sealskin boots. They struck the Peel River, fell in with a camp of Indians, and were saved. Bishop Stringer had lost fifty pounds on that trip. He rested at the fort for a little while, and then started home across country by dog-sled with an Indian. This time there were no mishaps.

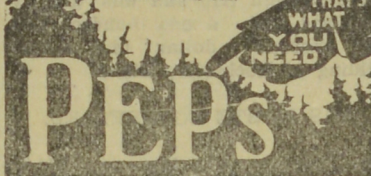
