SEEK OUTSIDE  
CONFERENCE FOR  
PASTOR'S SUCCESSOR

Rev. Neil McLauchlan Goes to Hamilton, Bermuda, in June---Committee Appointed to Secure Next Pastor of Methodist Church

The quarterly official board of the Fredericton Methodist Church, at a meeting held last night, appointed a committee composed of Recorder T. H. Colter, Ald. W. J. Osborne and J. M. Lemont to take up the matter of securing a successor to Rev. Neil McLauchlan as pastor of the church. Rev. Mr. McLauchlan will complete four years' pastorate in June next and will leave then for Hamilton, Bermuda, where he has accepted the pastorate. In that place he also will be Methodist chaplain to the British troops of the Bermuda garrison. The Hamilton church is in the Nova Scotia conference.

The Methodist congregation has extended invitations to three Methodist clergymen but in each case a previous acceptance of another pastorate has been made. Rev. R. G. Fulton of Chatham, Rev. Alfred Rogers of Yarmouth, N.S., and Rev. G. W. F. Glendenning of Halifax. Rev. Mr. Rogers is a son of the late Rev. Dr. Jabez Rogers, at one time Methodist pastor here.

It is understood that invitations will be extended to clergymen of Ontario, more being available than in the N.B. & P.E.I. Conference or in that of Nova Scotia.

GEORGE R. LEAVITT  
ARRESTED HERE ON  
WIRE FROM OLDTOWN

Traveller Charged With Breaking and Entering in Maine Town---Admits His Identity But Denies Guilt ---At Police Station

George R. Leavitt was arrested this morning at the Queen Hotel by Chief of Police McCollom and Detective James Roberts on a telegram from Town Marshal W. L. Avery of Old Town, Me., which stated that he was wanted at that place for breaking and entering. The accused was taken at once to the police station where he now is and the Oldtown authorities were communicated with. It is expected that Marshal Avery will arrive here tonight to take the prisoner back.

The accused, when arrested, admitted that he was the man mentioned in the telegram but disclaimed any knowledge of the charge and expressed surprise that he was arrested. He also promised that the persons in Oldtown who were responsible for his arrest would have an interesting time later.

Mr. Leavitt arrived here at noon yesterday and registered at the Queen as "Geo. Leavitt, Portland, Me." He was understood by the office staff of the hotel to be a commercial traveller, stating so in conversation. This is not the first occasion on which he has been in Fredericton, having registered at the Queen on October 24 as "Geo. Leavitt, Bangor, Me." He is twenty-three years of age and of good appearance. Since his arrival in the city he has made several personal purchases and is well supplied with funds.

The arrest has created a considerable sensation.
