## Tener Inaugurated President of National

**McGILL ATHLETIC  
 AUTHORITIES BUSY  
 WITH DONNELLY CASE**

**All Possible Evidence to be Secured  
 ---Board of Officials Taking up  
 the Matter**

(Montreal Herald.)

The evidence which the McGill Rugby Club is gathering in the case of one Joe Donnelly, erstwhile line plunger of their Intercollegiate championship football team and later accused of having played professional baseball in the Eastern Provinces, will probably all be in the hands of the investigating committee by the end of the present week and an investigation into the charges will then be held. The officials who have taken up the matter, Messrs. Daing, Paisley, Melville, Lee, Dr. Elder and several well known graduates of the university, have written to several of the most prominent men in Maritime Provinces sport, but as yet no replies have been received. Among these it is said are Mr. G. O. Gaston of Halifax, also the management of the St. John, N.B., Marathons, a semi-professional baseball team, and also the various newspapers in Fredericton, St. John and Halifax which published the reports on the case. The letter of Mr. James Lithgow, ex-president of the Maritime Provinces A.A.A., which was published exclusively in last Friday's Herald, will also be considered, while letters are expected daily from several men whose names Donnelly himself furnished to his investigators. The City League and Eastern Canada League charges will also be delved into.

McGill football authorities are deeply and quite justly incensed over many reports printed in out-of-town papers to the effect that the Red and White authorities were trying to hush the matter up and to whitewash Donnelly. Such is not the case. According to a statement which one of the prominent authorities on this matter gave to The Herald this morning, the McGill men and graduates are prepared to move heaven and earth to get at the true state of affairs and will do nothing to try and hush up the matter in any way at all.

"Intercollegiate and McGill sport" he said, "are not run on those lines."

The Intercollegiate Union are waiting for McGill to act in the matter and will not themselves interfere in any way. When the league holds its annual meeting about the first of January a complete resume of the whole affair will be laid before them and then any action which they see fit will be taken in the matter.

"Rather I will leave their enforcement to a more practical demonstration of those ideas and policies—leave it to those of you who are interested to note in the progress of the game the result and the benefit."

Jersey City, N.J., Dec. 9.—Hanley former captain and star twirler of the Manhattan College nine, will wear a Jersey City uniform next season and show his mettle in the International League circuit. Hanley was given a brief trial by the New Yorks a year ago and was released last summer he played with the Revue team of the Providence Amateur League and helped win the title for that team.

Ray Hulswitt, Jersey's new manager, was a shortstop on the National League, but the last two seasons he has been covering second base and hitting above the 300 mark. Hulswitt played with Louisville last season, but manager Jack Haydon consented to release him outright when he learned that the Jersey City management had been offered to him.

Hulswitt will play second base for the Skeeters, and Fogarty says that he will have unhampered control of the men.

**DAVE FULTZ  
 SAYS ATHLETICS ARE  
 NOT ANTAGONISTIC**

**No Defections from Ranks of Baseball  
 Players Fraternity---Philadelphia did  
 Not Sign Through Hostility**

New York, Dec. 9.—Pres. David L. Fultz of the Baseball Players' Fraternity issued a statement tonight denying the report that the Philadelphia Athletics as a team or as individuals had deserted the fraternity. Mr. Fultz said:

"Contrary to the report circulated today that the Athletics had deserted the fraternity, I can say without the slightest danger of contradiction that there have been no defections from our organization from any source. We have known all along, just where the Athletics stand, and their attitude today is just the same as it has been for months.

"It is true they did not sign our petition, being the only team out of the 30 in the fraternity which did not do so; but their failure was due to the preoccupations incident to a successful pennant fight and a World's Series, and not to any hostility to our requests.

"The report that they opposed our petition because they had no grievances and did not want to appear in a hostile attitude toward Mr. Mack portrays them in a very selfish light as though utterly callous to the hardships of others. I think that this statement is exceedingly unfair to them, and, in view of Mr. Mack's attitude, is so illogical as to brand it untrue on its face.

"Mr. Mack has already expressed himself as in favor of many of our requests and I am quite sure he does not look upon the petition as antagonistic to him in any sense; it is, therefore, quite apparent that his players could have no cause to do so.

"To those who understand the situation the report, coming at this time, is somewhat significant. We have expected for a long time attempts of this kind to lessen the strength of our fraternity, and months ago the players were well warned against them.

"I should not be surprised to see this report denied by the Philadelphia players themselves, thereby turning it into another boomerang."

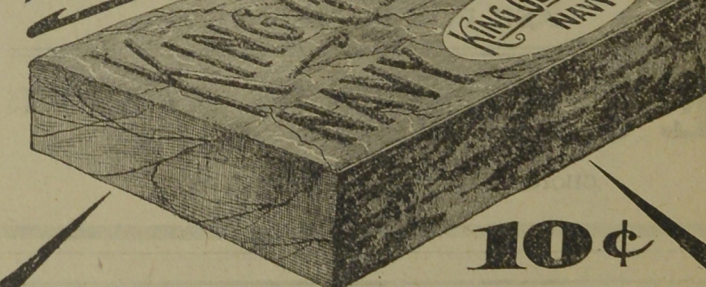
THOMAS DENIES IT.
