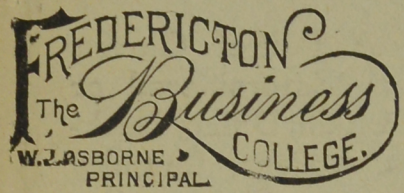

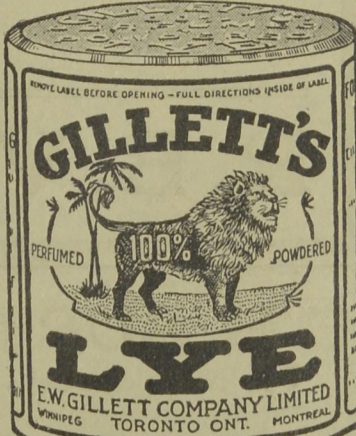
Peter Shaw, of Fredericton, has rented Charles Cronk's store of Lower Southampton and is now stocking it.

## THE ELECTRIC GENERATOR

The Dynamo Was Discovered Through a Boy's Experiment

The fact is not generally known that the electric generator or dynamo was actually due to an experiment by a 16-year-old boy, the son of Professor Henry, a scientist of fame in the first half of the last century.

Professor Henry had experimented exhaustively in electricity, endeavoring to get from chemical batteries a current that could be commercially used. He discarded a group of revolving magnets as useless, giving it to his son as a plaything. After the boy had amused himself with twirling it and adjusting it in accordance with his own ideas, he secured one of the little testing instruments—a galvanometer—used by the professor for detecting the electric current, and, hooking on the wires in the way he had seen his father attach them, he continued twirling the magnets.

While he was doing this, the professor entered the room, and was astonished to see the needle of the galvanometer drawn to one side, showing the existence of an electric current. This had never before been produced by such magnets without the use of a chemical battery. Within two hours, Professor Henry had attached the discarded magnets to a lathe, and by quick, steady revolutions, produced a current and an amazing spark. The true dynamic electric generator had been discovered.

When it is considered that every electric power plant, every electric lighting plant and every electric railway in the world are based upon that boy's play-hour revelation of the possibility of making an electric current without the use of chemicals, this little known instance of what boys have done for the world is entitled to a very high place.

One of the most curious features of the awakening of China is the addition of new words to the language. This does not mean merely names for such Western importations as motor cars, aeroplanes, cinematographs, etc., but words which have had to be invented to express ideas hitherto unknown to the Chinese mind, said "The London Chronicle." For instance, China had no indigenous word for ideal. Again "reform" had to be built up as an entirely new word, as also "to take the initiative," "protection of life," and "educate" as different from "instruct"—instances which throw a vivid light on certain aspects of the Chinese temperament.



## ONE CAUSE OF FOREST FIRES

Empty Glass Bottles Focus Sun's Rays and Ignite Leaves

Governmental authorities are always anxious to find out the causes of forest fires, since Canada has suffered severely in this respect in recent years. According to some theories, the cause is very often empty glass bottles.

It is an unfortunate fact that in practically every hunting camp there are men who are fond of their drink, and they are careless where they throw their discarded flasks or beer bottles. This heavy glass cast into a bundle of dry leaves will catch the rays of the sun and start a fire just as a magnifying glass would.

An inspector while walking along a wooded trail one day, saw a thin curl of smoke arising from leaves nearby. He went to the spot and looked carefully, but could see no cause for the fire. As he was in the act of stamping it out, he discovered the bottom of a beer bottle lying on the leaves, upon which the sun was playing its rays. This may appear to be a trivial reason to account for some of our great fires, but if it is true that fires are so caused, measures taken to prevent hunters and lumbermen from throwing empty bottles carelessly away might mean the prevention of much costly destruction.

## They Taboo Mirrors

There is a sect in Holland known as the Labadists, among whose members the use of mirrors is strictly prohibited. Their founder, Jean de Labadie, a seventeenth century Calvinistic minister, attracted many followers, but after his death they dwindled down, and now they are found only in a few remote villages of Friesland. Travelling in Holland in 1893, Lee y lit on a colony of Labadists. "Intermarrying mainly among themselves," he wrote, "they have quite a distinctive type—a singularly beautiful one, with their delicate lips and a curious air of refinement. They are fishermen—very prosperous—and their houses, with their china and silver ornaments and prints of the house of Orange, and great Bibles with silver clasps and perfectly preternatural neatness, are very interesting to see."

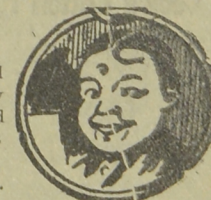
